COLLEGE ENDOWMENT.

The friends of Mt. Allison University are undertaking to raise an endowment fund of a quarter of a million dollars to put that institution on a good financial basis and increase its efficiency. There is no doubt the amount will be raised. Mt. Allison has many friends throughout the Dominion and many graduates possessed of means who could easily raise the sum needed—and more if the University were in financial stress. Recently the friends of Dalhousie University have rallied to its support and raised the sum of half a million dollars for its enlargement and more vigorous life. In the past few years Acadia has raised an equal sum, and neither institution has reached the limit of what it may expect from a generous and appreciative constituency. If Mt. Allison had been less modest in its request and had asked boldly and confidently for double the sum there is no apparent reason to doubt that its friends would have risen to the occasion.
