HAMILTON, ONT.—FOOD DISTRIBUTION AND PRICING BOARD

Question No. 1,823—Mr. Howe (Hamilton South):

1. What are the names of the members of the food distribution and pricing board appointed in Hamilton, Ontario under the Department of Defence Production?

Hon. C. M. Drury (Minister of Industry): 1 and 2. There is no organization in Hamilton, Ontario, associated with the Department of Defence Production and known as the "food distribution and pricing board". However, in that area to date, persons have been recruited on a stand-by basis to the war supplies agency by the Department of Defence Production to have responsibilities in the event of a nuclear war for the distribution, rationing and price control of food. The individuals concerned have requested that their names not be disclosed.

GRANTS TO MENTAL HEALTH ASSOCIATION

Question No. 1,831—Mr. Howe (Hamilton South):

What assistance, financial or otherwise, has been provided by the federal government to the Canadian mental health association in each of the last five years?

Hon. Judy V. LaMarsh (Minister of National Health and Welfare): The assistance provided the Canadian mental health association by the Department of National Health and Welfare consists of formal and informal consultation and collaboration as well as regular financial assistance. The chief of the department's mental health division is a member of the scientific planning council of the association and the public information officer of the division participates as an observer at these meetings. In addition to this technical and scientific assistance, there is collaboration in the production of materials for use by the association in its public education program.

An annual grant of \$15,000 is made to this organization.
