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AGRICULTURE

NATIONAL FARMERS UNION—MINISTER'S ABSENCE FROM CONVENTION

Mr. Stan J. Hovdebo (Prince Albert): Mr. Speaker, members of the National Farmers Union felt that the cavalier attitude of the federal Minister of Agriculture (Mr. Wise) amounted to an insult to farmers across Canada.

The Minister failed to reply to letters inviting him to address the fifteenth annual convention of the NFU in Charlottetown, despite repeated efforts by the Union to get some sort of response. When the federal Minister of Agriculture failed to appear at the convention, a resolution was passed unanimously expressing the delegates' indignation and concern.

The resolution stated "that this convention go on record expressing its concern and indignation over the casual attitude of indifference and lack of communication" shown by the Minister in not responding to the invitation. It is the first time in 15 years that a federal Minister of Agriculture has not addressed the Farmers Union convention.

The resolution further noted that the serious problems confronting the family farms across the country, and the Minister's "indifference and casual attitude", do not bode well for the survival of Canadian food producers.

CRITICISM OF GOVERNMENT ACTION

Nunziata (York South-Weston): Mr. Speaker, after years of slowly and methodically regaining control over our economy, the Tories are poised to halt and probably reverse the *maître chez nous* process through the creation of Investment Canada. The Tories should have named it "Sellout Canada".

The lack of concern among Tories for Canadian independence and Canadian sovereignty, whether political or economic, should not come as a surprise. The Tories have never been able to shake the "master-slave" mode of thinking. In the early years of this century the Tories were determined to keep us bound to Britain. Arthur Meighen said: "Ready, aye ready," to Lloyd George during the Chanak crisis. Now we have

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
