

**QUESTION OF COST
NOT YET DECIDED**

But City May Have to Pay For
Extra Work on the North
Subway Approach.

LOOK FOR NEW JAIL SITE

Present Location Is Not Suitable—Objection to Controller Foster's Car Line Plan.

In reply to a request of the board of control for a report from the city solicitor as to the advisability of an appeal to the governor-in-council for the distribution of the cost of an 18 foot subway on Yonge street, he says: "The question of the grade separation at North Toronto has not yet been argued before the Dominion Railway Board. The question of costs was expressly left open until the details of the scheme were settled. The only expression of opinion given by the board so far, is that if the city required the approach to the Yonge street subway to be made level, the city should bear the entire cost in excess of the 5 per cent. grant provided for in the plans of the railway company. There is, therefore, no ruling of the board, except on this report, upon which an appeal could be taken to the governor-in-council. He states that the corporation counsel has already been asked to apply to the board for a reconsideration of its ruling as to the change of grade, but the question of general costs would have to be argued before the board. There is anything upon which to form an appeal.

Civil Car Lines.
Commissioner Harris says that he cannot recommend the construction of civil car lines according to Controller Foster's motion, which is to establish connections between the Danforth and the Toronto Railway Company branch of the Toronto and York Radial Railway within the city limits, by requiring the Toronto Railway Company to lay down and operate a line of railway from the junction of Kingston road and East Queen street, along Eastern avenue, Front street, Princess street, Duke street, George street, Church street and Richmond street to Church street.

Another site will be sought for the present jail. The controllers affirm that the property is old and out of date, and deprecates the value of the property in the neighborhood. The question as to who is to pay the cost of the proposed duplex avenue parallel to Yonge street, 500 feet west, is a matter of conjecture. It was at first proposed to assess the properties on the street at 75 per cent. of the cost as first improvement, and 25 per cent. on the general rate, afterwards it was decided to reverse the plan on the ground that the improvement would be beneficial to the town as a whole. The board of control, with the exception of Controller Maguire, would rather the town take no action until annexation is finally consummated. "Let them go ahead," declared Controller Maguire. "The street will be used chiefly for transportation facilities, and on the other hand, we should assess the people with only 25 per cent. of the cost, and let the town pay 75 per cent."

Allocate Taxes.
The town council may pass a by-law, allocating the tax on Saturday, and should this be done, the city cannot repeat it after annexation. A concession will be held between the board and the town council, with a view to an amicable settlement. The board of control will support Controller Foster's recommendation to abolish committees, next year. Controller Maguire wants the legislation and reception committee left alone, because its scope could not be properly taken over by the board. "I cannot see that the dispensing of hospitality and the reception committee requires more attention than such work as that covered by the board of works," declared Controller Maguire. By a vote of 4 to 1, the change was recommended. Commissioner Harris' request for a conference with the board, has been referred back for a conference with the board of control.
