DIVISIONAL COURT.

In the Divisional Court in Gillard v. 1.0.0.F. the question was raised as to what constituted "good standing" of a member. Thomas B. Gillard, deceased, late Collector of Customs at Wallaceburg, was an Oddfellow, and his widow claims to be entitled to \$150 under the order's rules and to \$50 for funeral expenses. On the 9th May Mr. Gillard was taken sertously ill, on the 10th May his quarterly dues in arrear were paid, and he died on the 16th May. The widow claimed that the non-payment of dues prevented her husband from obtaining only certain sick benefits in his lifetime, and did not affect her rights or funeral benefits after his death, because the dues were paid in his lifetime. The case is a very important one to all Oddfellows, and no doubt the language of their rules will be made more explicit in future. So far the widow has the judgment of Judge Bell of Chatham in her favor, from whose decision the present appeal is taken.
