TALK OF AN ANGLO-AMERICAN UNION.

Only the Sharp Veto of the British Government Prevented a Combination of European Continental Powers to Dictate to the United States-Downfall of Spain a Foregone Conclusion-The Question Would Have Been as to How the Spoils were to be Allotted.

CHAMBERLAIN'S GREAT SPEECH.

The speech of Mr. Chamberlain at Birmingham, following that dedivered by Lord Salisbury to the bankers, has set the whole world talking more than any utterance of recent years. The telegraphic reports this morning show that the idea of an Anglo-Saxon alliance will not be received with coldness in the United States. Even The New York Sun, formerly the most inveterate of tail-twisters, approves of the idea, and says any statesman who frowns on the proposal is unworthy of notice. English provincial papers of large influence also talk approvingly.

The Spanish press comments on Mr. Chamberlain's speech are angry, and The Liberal (Government organ), predicts that on the day such a treaty shall be signed, "the general conflagration will burst out which has been so long suppressed by the powers.
