HAS MACARONI WHEAT A FUTURE IN CANADA?

Northwestern States Cultivating I Largely Now, But Local Men Don't Enthuse Over It.

Has macaroni wheat any future

This is a very much to the point query in view of the flattering measure of success the cereal with the name that savors of Italy and things Italian has scored in wheat-growing Northwestern States. It is a safe guess, tho, that anybody who takes the trouble to speak to local grain men on the subject will not decide that a very rosy prospect is in sight for the new importation, that is, if he eccepts their views. There is a natural (conservatism among them In tural (conservatism among them In estimating the virtues of anything new to this country in the grain line, wherein they show themselves to be even as the United States authorities were last year when the invading macaroni clamored for a trial.

It has had it, and here is what a competent expert, Capt. D. L. Wellman, of Frazee, Minn., gives as his opinion of the cereal:

"I find the farmers of Minnesota very curious regarding macaroni

I know several grain growers who will want at least ten bushels of this wheat for seed next spring. Every kernel will be needed for seed next spring. My advice to all who have any is to keep it until next spring when they will get a dollar a bushel for it. It's extremely foolish to sell this splendid product at 25 cents below the market price of wheat." Makes a Weak Dough.

There is more than mere optimism in the above utterances; there is an assured confidence in the future of macaroni wheat that must be gratifymacaroni wheat that must be grathy-ing to its well wishers. But that the experts are not all prepared to give unqualified praise to the newcomer is the text of the remarks of Deau J. H. Sheppard of North Dakota Aggiltural College, who is quoted as say-

The best macaroni varieties are not The best macaroni varieties are not properly called goose wheats, but are more like the bread wheats. But measured by Minneapolis red Fife patent standards, all admit that macaroni wheats are somewhat down in the scale. The gluten is even more abundant than in fife and blue stem, but it is not so tough. The constituent compounds of the gluten, the gliadin and glutenin, are presumably not in the right proportions, making a weak the right proportions, making a weak dough. The sheets of dough, forming between the interstices, or holes, in the loaf, will stretch sufficiently to

the loaf, will stretch sufficiently to make a light loaf with crumb corresponding to the standards we have taught our trade to demand."

Local Experts Not Enthusiastic.

Macaroni wheat is softer than Fife and would not be suited to the climate of Canada's west, that is it would probably not thrive in Manitoba, tho possibly conditions in Alberta might be favorable to its growth. This is the opinion of local grain men, but they cannot see why, even if macaroni wheat were to flourish in Canadian recalled that the summer of 1902 was

In their opinion the latter is of the stuff to defy all challengers, and not to be lightly supplanted. 
