THE PEACE

Slow Progress Made by the Deliberators.

The Philippine Question Not Yet Reached-Cuban Debt Business Shelved.

London, Oct. 14.-The Paris correspondent of the Times says: "The peace negotiations are necessarily slow, being conducted less by exchange of notes and statements. Senor Montero Rios, president of the Spanish commission does not understand English. Consequently the few words exchanged must be interpreted, and even then they are defective till committed to paper.

The Cuban debt question had thus

already been laid on the table, and the American commissioners had already given a peremptory refusal to discuss a principle which had been settled, as they considered, by the peace preliminaries. Faithful to the attitude adopted by them from the outset, they seemed resolved to take their stand on the instructions-or, rather, the precise and concise ordersthey brought with them; but the Spaniards, on their side, do not think themselves bound to bow with docility to the imperative instructions of another government. They returned to the charge yesterday, if I am well informed, urging the generally admitted principle, which imposes on conquerors the burdens belonging to the territory conquered, either in their own behalf or that of their clients. They insisted that it would be an extraordinary course to saddle Spain, already in so lamentable a financial position, with the Cuban debt, while surrendering to

Plots That Failed

Kaiser

While on His Trip Through the Holy Land.

The Situation in Paris More Serious

Than Any Time Since the Commune. Alexandria, Egypt, Oct. 15 .- The Alexandria police have arrested nine Italian anarchists, and have thereby

frustrated a plot against Emperor William, now on his way to the Holy Land, to be present at the consecration of the Church of the Saviour at Jerusalem. The first to be arrested was a cafekeeper, a well-known anarchist, in whose house the police discovered two

wire-bound bombs of great strength,

full of bullets. This arrest was made in consequence of a notification from the Italian consul-general at Cairo that two anarchists had left Cairo for Port Said. The police investigation showed that the arrested cafe-keeper had bribed the steward of a steamer sailing yes terday from Alexandria to Port Said and Syria to take on board a box of bombs. Apparently the anarchists originally intended to use the bombs at the Palais Abidin, at Cairo, while Emperor William and the khedive

changed their plans and decided to attack him in Palestine. The liveliest satisfaction is felt over the smart captures, and the German consulate has expressed its warmest thanks. The Cairo anarchists who left for Port Said have not yet been ar-

The French Plot.

LOUIS BONAPARTE IMPLICATED. Paris, Oct. 15.-The government officials here refuse to furnish any information regarding the discovery of the plot against the government. But it is rumored that the conspiracy involved Prince Louis Bonaparte, who is a colonel of the Russian Lancers, and in whose favor his elder brother, Prince Victor Bonaparte, recently resigned the leadership of the imperialist party. It is added that certain political personages have handed the premier important documents, including a cipher dispatch, compromising certain military men. The minister of war has canceled his intended absence

from Paris. The Liberte asserts that the military men alleged to have been concerned in the conspiracy are Gens. Bois-deffre and Pellieux. Attempts, it is alleged, were also made to compromise Gen. Zurlinden, the military governor of Paris, who for a short time was minister of war, but it appears the present minister of war, Gen. Chanoine, refused to countenance it.

ITS ORIGIN. According to the rumor, the plot arose from a forged letter, purporting to have been sent by Gen. Boisdeffre to Gen. Zurlinden, containing the words "Let us be ready for Saturday." The semi-official Temps last evening minimized the affair, and says the officials of the ministry of war formally deny that a plot existed. The Temps suggests that misinterpretation was placed on some of the numerous dispatches now being exchanged between the different garrisons, in connection with the present movement of troops, which led to strange reports

SERIOUS SITUATION.

London, Oct. 15. - The situation in Paris is regarded in well-informed quarters here as being more serious than at any time since the commune. The St. James' Gazette says: A military revolution, however peaceful, which replaces the Brisson cabinet with the nominees of the generals, would imperil the relations between England and France almost to the breaking point. The semi-official and partly inspired Paris papers are still pretending that negotiations are proceeding between the two governments, and France believes it, although everybody in England knows the statement to be ridic ulous. Even suppose Major Marchand is unconditionally withdrawn from Fashoda, the difficulties with France will in no way end. Behind it lies the whole question of the Bahr-El-Ghazel, the richest prize in the Soudan." The Paris correspondent of the Times

says: It is impossible to obtain clear proofs of the existence of a plot. I believe, however, that the idea of some act of force haunts certain military minds. Maddened and stung by violent criticisms of the army arising out of the Dreyfus affair, they are especially irritated at the attitude of civilians in claiming to interfere in the detention of Col. Picquart, for which the en-

Italians Conspire to Kill the tire military authorities are responsible. Looking to the excited state of men's minds at the conflict between the military and civil authorities, it is only surprising that such alarms

are not more frequent. SPECULATIONS.

A Paris telegram says: It is impossible to pick out the truth from the mass of rumors regarding the alleged military plot. The general idea is that it was intended by a pretended revisionist demonstration to insult and provoke the army into some act which might have led to the arrest and incarceration of a Dreyfusite and the proclamation of a military government. Apparently the Orleanists were at the bottom of the movement, and an English duke is mentioned. There is little doubt that the plot has been frustrated, but a very uneasy feeling prevails. It appears that quite recently the gen-darmerie were withdrawn from the great towns of Normandy and Picardy to Paris, but it may be assumed this fine body, under orders from the prefect of police, and the minister of the interior, cannot be moved without first proclaiming a state of siege. FORTY THOUSAND TROOPS IN

PARIS. A reliable estimate of the troops recently brought to the capital on account of the strike puts the number here or within distance at 40,000

men. A long and vague semi-official statement has appeared, suggesting various possible motives - such as Dreyfusite intrigues or an attempt by the Socialists-to frighten the governwere there. When the kaiser decided not to visit Egypt the anarchists ment into dispersing the troops that now prevent the success of the strike, to explain the rumors of a military conspiracy. The mysterious allusions, however, and the absence of any straightforward denial tend to encourage the belief that there must be some ground for the rumors.

BRUSSELS PEOPLE EXPECT A COUP.

The Duke of Orleans, accompanied by Comte Sabran Pontevas, has arrived at Brussels to watch events. The papers believe the reports of a coup. The Etoile-Belge regards it as "the last desperate effort of the French general staff to save itself from downfall." Other papers say that the conspirators had been meeting clandestinely at Versailles, and that M. Brisson has intercepted cipher correspondence pointing to a design to seize some fifty prominent republicans.

Suggestion That Russia Should Side With France.

France Alleged to Have Concluded Treaty With Abyssinia Against Great Britain-Marchand's Report on Its Way to Cairo.

Paris, Oct. 15.—Del Fosse, the royal-

ist leader, in a letter published in the Gaulois, says that at the conclusion of the Chino-Japanese war, France unhesitatingly assisted Russia, and the time has now come for Russia to repay that service by helping France against England. It is evident, he says, that if it should be necessary for England to go to war, France would be helpless alone. Russia is the only power that can contemplate war with England with serenity, for she is invulnerable. The Novoe Vremya (St. Petersburg), commenting on the British blue book giving the correspondence between Great Britain and France concerning Fashoda, says it is difficult to believe that the negotiations will not end in the manner Great Britain sires. It adds that France, thanks to her present rulers, finds herself on the verge of a serious diplomatic defeat.

AN UNLIKELY STORY. Rome, Oct. 15.—The Italie says this norning: "France has concluded a morning: treaty with Abyssinia against England in the Fashoda affair.

MAJOR MARCHAND'S MESSAGE. Cairo, Oct. 15 .- A steamer having on board an officer belonging to the French force, under the command of Major Marchand, now at Fashoda, on the Nile, has arrived at Khartoum. This officer is the bearer of the report sent for by the French minister for foreign affairs, M. Delcasse, by courtesy of the British Government, over the Anglo-Egyptian lines of communication. It is presumed the officer will proceed to Cairo in order to be able to use the official cipher of the French consulate here for transmitting the reports to Paris.
