CANNOT RESURFACE ASPHALT; CITY HAS NOT POWER TO DO SO

Plan of Ald. Matthews Knocked Out—Contracts for Sewers and Septic Tanks.

Ald. Matthews' scheme to have the asphalt pavements on Richmond and Dundas streets resurfaced this year, was knocked in the head at a meeting of No. 2 committee held last night.

Mayor Judd reported that City Solicitor Meredith has stated that the city could not assume the payments yet to be made by the people on the streets, in order to have the pavements resurfaced. Nothing can be done in the way of a new pavement or resurfacing until such times as the pavements are paid for.

This put a damper on the proposal to put down what would practically be a new pavement, and other means of putting the old pavements in shape were discussed.

Ald. Saunders suggested that it would be cheaper for the city to buy the material and do the repairing itself this year. The mayor said he thought the city has power to do this despite the contract made with the Waterloo Company in 1902 to make the repairs for five years at a given price per yard.

On motion of Ald. Saunders it was decided to ascertain from the city solicitor if the city has power to do the work itself, and if Mr. Meredith gives a favorable answer tenders for the supplying of the material necessary to do the repairs will be called for, and City Engineer Graydon will do the work by day labor.

East End Factory.

The Empire Manufacturing Company, brass founders and finishers, wrote the committee that it has purchased a site for a new factory on Dundas street east, adjoining the interswitching line, and that it is necessary that the firm should be supplied with drainage connection at once. The company suggested that the sewer of the Canadian Packing Company should be enlarged and lowered, so that it will be an accommodation to the Empire Company, and the many other factories which will be sure to locate on Dundas street east shortly. The company offered to pay an amount equal to what it would be compelled to pay under a frontage tax in the city for the sewer, and to pay the amount in cash to the city.

The company also asked to be supplied with water for fire protection purposes from the main which the water commissioners intend to put down to carry the water to the city station from the well on the premises of the London Showcase Company.

In conclusion, the company stated that if the above requests were not granted it could not build in the locality named, and that as it had received flattering offers to go elsewhere, if nothing was done, these offers would have to be considered.

Outside the City.

The property being outside the city, there was some fear expressed that the committee could not spend civic funds to fix the sewer, as it is not within the city limits. City Engineer Graydon said it will cost about \$900 to do the work.

The city solicitor will be consulted as to what course the city will have to pursue to make the improvements.

As regards the application for fire protection, it was stated by Chairman Matthews that a hydrant has been placed at the extreme city limits, about 75 feet from the site purchased by the Empire Manufacturing Company.

Manager Stevens, who, with Mr. C. H. Ivey, was present, to press the claims of the company, said that this hydrant will give him the protection it needs if the city will consent to allow the firemen to use it.

The chairman declared that the city could not give a written guarantee, but that the firm will be given the protection asked.

Annex the District.
"I guess we will have to annex the district east of the city," Mayor Judd said. "It would save us a deal of trouble."

A Nelson street resident complained of the manner in which the dumping of rubbish is going on at the foot of Waterloo street. He asked that the city compel the dumping to be done south of where the loads are now deposited, so as to fill in the river bank and make a passable roadway along Nelson street from Waterloo to Wellington.

MOUNT FOREST FAIR

Good Show in Spite of Bad Weather—The Prize Winners.

Mount Forest, April 11. — In spite of bad weather and wretched roads, the first annual spring stock show of the Mount Forest Agricultural Society was well attended, and proved an all-round success. Mr. Simpson Rennie, of Toronto, gave a practical and interesting address in connection with the judging of the grain. The prize-winners were:

The engineer was instructed to see that the dump is changed, but he was cautioned by the mayor to do no work to Nelson street along the block named, as the street is only a few feet wide and has never been taken over by the city.

"If you do any work to the street you will leave the city liable for actions for damages," his worship said.

It was stated that the property mentioned will be taken over by the city when the site for the new isolation hospital is purchased. The city proposes to close Waterloo street from Ottawa avenue to Nelson street.

Sewer Contracts Let.

The following tenders for sewers, being the lowest, were accepted:

Bruce street, main sewer—C. Leathorne, at \$8,520, and 40 cents a foot for side drains.

Ottawa avenue, main sewer—C. Dill, Toronto, at \$10,454, and 65 cents a foot for side drains, and \$381 for relaying section from Maitland street to the N. tracks.

Wellington street north sewer—Ben Johnson, at \$900, and 40 cents a foot for side drains.

Fullarton street sewer—Ben Johnson, at \$400, and 30 cents a foot for side drains.

Glebe street sewer, Fred Harding, at \$369, and 29 cents a foot for side drains.

Wortley road sewer, Blight & Fielder, at \$1,333, and 40 cents a foot for side drains.

St. George street sewer, Fred Harding, at \$254, and 30 cents a foot for side drains.

New Septic Tanks.

The tender of A. E. Oakley, Berlin, to supply the city with fifteen septic tanks, at a cost of \$12,554 10, was accepted, providing the city has the funds.

The agent of the Steel Construction Company, of Toronto, was present, and he stated that if Mr. Oakley would use the company's steel for the reinforced work of the tanks it would save the city about \$300. It was resolved to ask Mr. Oakley what he will be able to allow the city if he uses the steel named.

Parks Commissioner Pearce presented by certain East Londoners to have a path put in Queen's Park from the Campbell street gate to the Ontario and King streets gate, but he did not say anything regarding the cost. He was instructed to give the committee an estimate at once.

A Salary Increase.

The ward foremen asked that they be paid \$2 a day the whole year round in the future. Now they are paid \$10 a week in the winter and \$12 a week in the summer.

The committee decided to grant the request, but the street car tickets which in the past have been furnished to the foremen will be discontinued. City Engineer Graydon put up a strong argument in favor of the increase.

A brick crossing will be constructed on the east side of Colborne street, across Central avenue.

The engineer was empowered to buy a quantity of Masillon brick for crossings at once.

After investigating the matter, the committee decided that W. J. Reid has no right to ask the city to place a clause in its agreement with him re the fence along the breakwater to the effect that at no time in the future will the city increase the height of the present breakwater. Mr. Meredith will be instructed to place no such clause in the agreement.

Street Railway Repairs.

The committee agreed to allow the street railway company to pave alongside its rails of the west track on Richmond street from the G. T. R. to Dundas street with brick, provided the work is done by the 1st of June. Manager King refuses to pave the entire track allowance with brick on the ground that it would be too costly. A time limit was set for the completion of the work at the suggestion of the city.

The company's lease of the sewage farm will be renewed for another year, if he is satisfied, at \$100 per annum. Topping has been paying \$90 a year, but the city now has an offer of \$100 a year for the farm.

ARSENIC IN THE BEER.
Saintfield, Ont., April 11.—The coroner's jury on the death of Mrs. Homer Gregg, an aged lady, who died on March 15, shortly after drinking a cupful of porter taken out of a gem jar found that death was the result of arsenic in the beverage. By what means it came there is unknown.

The verdict was based on the evidence of Professor Ellis, of Toronto, the analyst, who declared that he found arsenic and copper in one of the jars of porter sent him.

Officials of the Brewing Company, Toronto, testified that it was impossible for arsenic to have got into the porter while being bottled.

The case is causing a lot of talk, and County Constable McCully is investigating.

FRUIT-SPRAYING ORGANIZATIONS

A Plan for Encouraging United Effort in Producing the Best Results.

Toronto, April 12.—The Minister of Agriculture for Ontario has, for the past two years, had under consideration plans for further assisting the fruit growers of the Province. Spraying has now become, in producing a superior grade of fruit, the most important operation of the year, and while widely practiced in certain sections, has not yet been given the attention that it requires in the apple sections. The advent of the power sprayer is of such recent date that the advantages it gives, especially in the spraying of apple orchards, is not yet appreciated.

For many years the department of agriculture has been advocating more and better spraying. Demonstrations in the use of hand and power outfits, and the preparation and application of the most effective mixtures, have been given throughout the Province with satisfactory results. It is now felt that such information has been sufficiently diffused and another step forward is proposed.

The Provincial Fruit Growers' Association has within the past three years assisted in organizing a large number of fruit-growing associations. One of the aims of these associations has been the co-operative spraying of orchards of their members, and it is now proposed to assist them and kindred organizations in such spraying work. With this aim in view, the Minister of Agriculture has asked the Legislature for a grant of \$6,000 to be devoted to the assistance of fruit-growers in the purchase and operation of power spraying outfits. Many associations already own and are operating such machines, and these will receive the same aid as those organizing during 1907. The conditions under which the grants are available have been made as simple as possible with the hope that a decided stimulus will be given to the proper spraying of orchards during this and coming seasons. Following are the regulations covering the payment of the grants:

A grant of \$50 will be made to any five or more farmers who unite to form a fruit growers' association for the purchase and operation of a power spraying outfit during the season of 1907. These associations need not be incorporated to qualify for this grant, though incorporation of co-operative associations should be obtained if the full benefits of co-operation are desired.

Co-operative fruit growing associations, owning and operating two or more power sprayers, will be eligible to draw a grant for each machine operated.

The number of such associations receiving assistance during the present year shall not exceed 100.

At least 25 acres of fruit trees must

be thoroughly sprayed during the proper season with each outfit.

A reasonable portion of such spraying must be done on the farms or orchards of each of the parties forming the association.

Such associations, before receiving any portion of the grant, shall satisfy an inspector of the department of agriculture that the above conditions have been complied with, and shall make such reports as shall satisfy the Minister of Agriculture.

Associations desirous of participating in this grant must apply to the department not later than the first day of May.

AN ABBE IN COURT

Sensational Trial of a Paris Pastor Over Church War.

Paris, April 11.—The Abbe Jouia, pastor of the church at St. Augustin, was arraigned in a police court today to answer the charge of inciting to rebellion from the pulpit in connection with the taking of the church inventories.

The court was crowded in consequence of the public expectation that revelations were contained in the documents seized at the papal nunciature and that the prosecuting attorney would probably read them.

The abbe, replying to the magistrate, declared that he had never transgressed the laws.

The prosecutor read letters of Mgr. Montaigni, which he declared, demonstrated that the former secretary of the nunciature was continually intriguing in order to hinder the French clergy from obeying the church and state separation law and that he acted as the real head of the church in France.

The court will render judgment on April 13.
