London, Jan. 9 .- The announcement hat the Times is about to change hands has fallen like a mighty bombshell on the British nation. It is no exaggeration to say that it is regarded as a matter of almost national

The Times, which has so long been national institution, has been obtainby the Imperial Tariff Reform with Mr. Charles Arthur Pearson, first chairman of the league, as controller. The Times has been recently sitting on the fence, and occasionally coquetting with the Tariff Reform Leaguers, and at times tipping a friendly wink to the free traders. The followers of Cobden have made efforts to capture the Thunderer, as the Times has ever been known, but they showed timidity.

The tariff reformers, having decided to hold their banner high at the next general election and believing that the bulk of the electors will come to their standard, have captured the greatest of English newspapers.

Seek Political Support.
