

Tremendous Activity Shown In All the Shipbuilding Yards, Where High Pressure Is Maintained-Hundreds of War and Com merce Vessels Are

Under Way. Glasgow, Sept. 1—(By Mail).—On the aull of a big ship being built in one of the many yards that line the river canks of Scotland and Northwest Engand, a workman has written with chalk in bold letters six feet high five words that express the determination of British shipbuilders to "do their bit" toward defeating the German submarines. A staff correspondent of the Associated Press has just completed a trip through the principal yards of the rivers Tees, Tyne, Wear and Clyde as the guests of the foreign office and the admiralty.
