

YOUTH SEEKS MONEY COMMISSION LEARNS

This Responsible For Small
Number Entering Ministry,
Young Methodists Say.

Before Rev. Denzil Ridout, Rev. Peter Bryce and Professor Langford, members of the Methodist Survey Commission, the young people of the Methodist church of London voiced their opinions of the defects of the young people's work in the city, in the First Methodist church on Tuesday evening. Various opinions were given to the questions asked by Rev. P. Bryce, who was chairman.

One of the principal questions asked by the commission was the reason why young people do not have a greater tendency to enter the ministry. One representative of the young Methodist people said that the young boy of today wanted to make big money, in a little time, and other professions offered much greater financial returns than the ministry. At this juncture Rev. Mr. Bryce said that the Methodist Church was endeavoring to give the minister a large enough salary to assure him of moderate comfort.

Rev. Mr. Bryce outlined a program to keep young people in closer connection with the church by developing them physically as well as spiritually. The survey continues in session all this week, and London is the first city after by the Methodist Survey Commission in connection with the survey, sixteen cities will be visited.

BUILDING OPERATIONS TO START IN SPRING

Stansell Motor Car Company
Completes Arrangements
For Local Plant.

Building operations will be started on the plant of the Stansell Motor Car Company, the third automobile factory to locate here during the past few weeks, in the early spring. It was announced today by William R. Stansell, the founder of the company. The plant will be erected on ten acres of land located at Hale street and the G. T. R. tracks and an option has been secured on adjoining lands to provide for expansion.

It is expected that within a comparatively short time the company will be on a footing to produce from 1,500 to 2,000 cars annually. This number will be increased as the plant is enlarged. As a start the company will employ approximately 250 men, and this number will be gradually increased until employment will be given to at least from 1,000 to 1,500 men.

While Mr. Stansell could not make public the cost of the plant, he announced that the buildings are to be of concrete one-story in height, and with saw-tooth roofs. The buildings will be so arranged that additions can be made from time to time. The plant is located on the corner of Hale street and the G. T. R. tracks.

BEAT TIME WITH Feet; Is Almost Beaten Up

Good Basements for Gymnasiums by Commissioner.

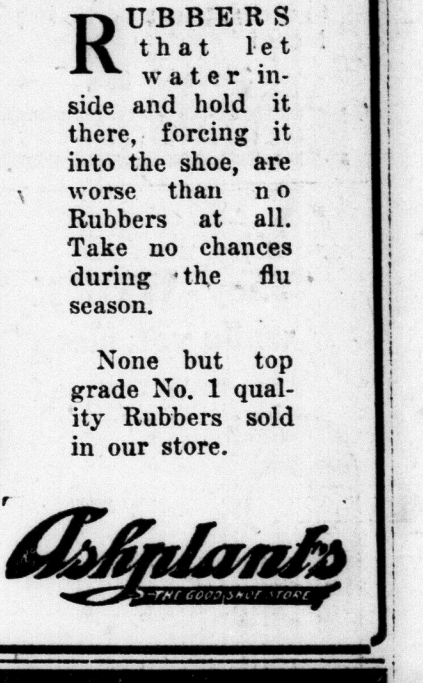

The meeting of young people held in the First Methodist Church on Tuesday evening these two members of the commission laid emphasis on the great need for good basements for the physical development of the young people, and several representatives at this meeting reported a lack of room in their respective schools. Almost invariably the complaints laid before the commission on Tuesday evening were to the effect that basements were not properly laid out to meet all the requirements. Askin Street Methodist Church was the only church which could boast of a real gymnasium. According to reports heard last night it is not probable that the commissioners in their survey would find every church fully equipped as is considered necessary.

TORONTO, Nov. 2.—With reference to the decision of Armour & Co. to close their plant at Hamilton, Ont., J. W. Duval, general manager of Armour & Co., explained today that the decision of the Hamilton plant was made imperative chiefly because the export market was practically gone, and because hogs were at prohibitive prices. Another factor was that the production of hogs in the Hamilton territory had not been sufficient to enable volume operation, which was essential, due to the small margins on which the company operated. The plant had been operated on a basis far short of its capacity, and had greatly increased the overhead expenses.
