AT REQUEST OF CROWN

Was Charged With Stealing Gold From Local Firm.

The fact that he had always borne a good reputation and that a prominent man in Toronto, a member of the Big Brotherhood movement, was interested in his case, saved Alfred Chapman, 105 Cumberland street, Toronto, from a term in prison when he pleaded guilty to theft before Magistrate Graydon today. Chapman was charged with stealing a quantity of gold and gold solder a few weeks ago from F. and E. H. Allport, wholesale jewelers, in this city.

When Chapman was first arraigned, a week ago, his counsel, J. M. McEvoy, told the crown that certain extenuating circumstances surrounding the case warranted an investigation by the crown before the case was heard. Because of

He started to drink, and while under the influence of liquor and in the company of his three companions, committed theft in Toronto and in this city. The two women were arrested here and were taken back to Toronto.

Conscience Stricken.

Before Chapman was apprehended he became conscience-stricken and wrote to an employee of Allport's, confessing that he stole the gold and that he still had it in his possession. He gave himself up to the police.

The magistrate in Toronto felt sorry for the young man, and because a member of the Big Brotherhood movement took an interest in him he let him out on suspended sentence. Chapman was then brought to London to answer the charge here.



Italian Fleet Manoeuvres in Bay Before Fiume.
