Canada, or that are being made in the United States." City Auditor Archie Screaton stated in an interview with The Advertiser today. He has just returned from a six months' visit in Paris with his son, Fred Screaton, foreign representative of the New York firm of Lord & Taylor's, and had a good opportunity to make a survey of the situation.

"When one considers the countries whose production of the ordinary requirements of civilization was entirely disturbed during the long years of the war and realize that they had either to fill these needs at an abnormal high price or practice the strictest economy, one might understand that the available supplies got down to almost vanishing point by the period of the armistice.

"Since that time the exchange rates of the different couptries of the continent of Europe have been so advanced that in order to supply their absolute wants they had to pay a premium equal to the extent to which their currency had depreciated as compared with that of the country from which the purchases were being made. They had to have raw materials such as cotton, wool, coal, which were positive necessihave raw materials such as cotton. have raw materials such as cotton, wool, coal, which were positive necessities. Structural steel, bridges, rolling-stock, which at least for the destruction and wastage of war had to be purchased, no matter at what cost, and all of this had not commenced to provide for a surplus of raw materials in these countries, which could be manufactured for export. The only hope of these countries is to obtain enough raw material to enable them to put in their own labor, producing an article which could be sold at a profit on the labor cost. Take, for example, the case of France: They require to purchase at the time a large quantity of essentials from America. Unless France can ship goods to America in a degree which will reasonably compare with the amount of her purchase and until she can increase her production and reduce her importations from America, there can be no reason for improvement on the exchange.



D'ANNUNZIO'S LITTLE ARMY IS PREPARING TO FIGHT TO FINISH

Italian Fleet Manoeuvres in Bay Before Fiume.

CUT COMMUNICATIONS

Followers of Soldier-Poet Are Taking Their Position Very Seriously.

Trieste, Dec. 2.—The Italian fleet stationed at Pola steamed up the Gulf of Quarnero yesterday, manoeuvred in the bay before Flume, and then slowly passed very close to the mouth of the harbor, as in review. The fleet stood out in contrast to d'Annunzio's little fleet of one dreadnought, four destroyers and employ early movered at the Flume and smaller craft moored at the wharfs.
Some of d'Annunzio's soldiers on the

Some of d'Annunzio's soldiers on the shore emptied their rifies at the fleet, but no casualties resulted. The whole manoeuvre was part of a demonstration by the Italian Government for the purpose of showing what resources it had at hand. On land, Carabineers were taking up positions along the lines of demarkation.

D'Annunzio's soldiers, who have been greatly stirred up by his appeals for the defence of Fiume, are taking the "war" situation very seriously. Their number defence of Flume, are taking the war situation very seriously. Their number is estimated at about 4,000, including detached units of artillery, engineers, cavalry, gas battallons, air forces, ar-mored motor cars and machine gunners. The cutting off of communication with Fiume by both land and sea is regarded as imminent.

To prove that he did not make an idle boast, he pointed to a companion, Harry Allen, who walked ahead, and then said to another companion who walked beside him: "I can lick him."


