C., Jun. 4.-A new policy of terror abroad especially in nearby cor les, has been decided upon by the Russian Soviet, according to official advices from Moscow received Master of Vessel Is-Not Extoday by the United States Government. Nikolai Lenine is quoted by the advices as saying in a proclamation to the commune committees of Europe that "it is absolutely indispensable to keep the bourgeoise enemy busy with internal trouble in order that fourteen persons lost their lives when they cannot injure Soviet Russia.

Great strikes should be organized throughout the world, this version of the proclamation says, "and agitation for the establishment of commercial relations with Russia should be increased. In order to fight famine and attack capitalism throughout the universe these things should be done.'

Is Wrecked in Storm.

Madrid, Jan. 4.-Two hundred and the Spanish steamer Santa Isabel was wrecked near Villa Garcia on Saturday night, says a telegram received incre from the governor of Ponte Vedga. Fifty-six persons were saved, but many of them were injured. Capt. Muniz Riqueld the captain of the vessel was severely hurt, and it is not expected that he will recover. Many bodies have been washed ashore, and in several cases whole families were drowned. Among the saved was an infant 3 vears old, whose parents are believed to be dead. Latest dispatches from Cadiz state the ship was driven on the roc's during a tremendous storm, and the large number of deaths is attributed to the fact that the passengers had been confined to their cabins because of the violence of the storm, many of them being asleep. wrecked near Villa Garcia on Saturday

The majority of those rescued from the steamer were unable to speak oh being landed, owing to their frightful experiences during the hours of clinging to the wreckage in the terrific storm and cold. No word has been received from Mr. Goulding and, in any event, it is not probable he would know of the movements of the party until they actually arrived at this post. Which trail the officers and their guides will pursue from Moose Factory to the C. N. R. is uncertain, and will depend largely upon weather conditions.

Followed the River.

The Indian runner apparently followed the Missanable River direct to Mattice, where the railway crosses that stream, but the larger company may strike off across country and come into Cochrane by way of Clute and the Abitibl River.
