LORD MILNER AT U.C.C. TALKS ON EDUCATION

Says Inefficient Teachers Are a Menace—Rich Men's Sons Not Always Good Scholars.

There was a large attendance at the prize day celebration at Upper Canada College yesterday afternoon.

Principal Aiden welcomed the guests and announced that the old boys had donated \$2000, one third of the cost of a new gymnasium with swimming bath, to be ready for next year.

The prizes were presented by Archbishop of Toronto, Sir W. Mortimer and Lady Clark, Bishop Reeves, Canon Welch, Provost Macklem, Principal Falconer, Col. G. T. Denison, W. Boyd, G. R. R. Cockburn, Canon Cody, J. Gibbs Ridout, Frank Arnold and Allen Baines, M.D.

Lord Milner was given an ovation. He said that the college was associated in his mind with his friend, ex-Principal Dr. Geo. Parkin, who is now engaged in an ennobling work of Rhodes Scholarship awards. In this mission was to elevate and unify the Anglo-Saxon race. So far as he had been able to ascertain the work of the Upper Canada College was ideal in its comprehensive character. He regretted that in England some of the school teachers appeared scarcely efficient, which was a serious menace if widespread.

Another difficulty in England was that many sons of prominent men regard their college course with levity, and went thru college without any serious addition to their stock of knowledge. This was probably owing to the life being without the object which the building up of a young nation affords.

Lord Milner closed by requesting a holiday in commemoration of his visit, and which was promised by the principal.

The J. Herbert Mason medals were presented to D. M. Goldie and J. V. Young by Lord Milner. Both were in the uniform of the Royal Military College.

The Upper Canada College Old Boys' Association elected W. G. Gooderham president at its annual meeting yesterday. It also decided to celebrate the 80th anniversary of the college by simultaneous dinners thruout Canada in January.

TORONTO LIFE SAVER DROWNS

Albert Martin of Corunna, Who Saved Man From Drowning, Loses Life.

SARNIA, Oct. 22.—The body picked up in the river near St. Clair, Mich., Wednesday afternoon by Frank Currier, captain of a ferry boat, has been identified as that of Albert Martin, aged 21 years, of Corunna, Ont., eight miles from here. Martin had a medal pinned to his vest, which had been given to him for saving a Toronto man from drowning in Lake Ontario. The body had apparently been in the water several days. Relatives say that he left home on the night of Oct. 3, and since that time nothing was seen of him. He was an expert swimmer. He came to his death, friends believe, as the result of being run down by some lake freighter.
