

RUSSIANS DRIVE TO CARPATHIANS

Part of Army Reaches Point Fifty Miles South of Czernowitz.

FOE GETS SURROUNDED

Only Miracle Can Preserve Army of Gen. Pflanzner in Bukovina.

On both sides of the Turia River and further south over the general line from Svinouchi to Grochov were driven further back. The Turia River is a tributary of the Pripiet and it takes its rise just north of Vladimir-Volynski and runs thru Kovel northward to Pripiet. The intelligence that the Russians are now on both sides of this stream appears to indicate that they are converging on Kovel by a circling movement.

Count von Bothmer holds that Russian attacks against his army from the Halovrenka-Batoulintz line, north of Przelska, were repulsed.

Austrian official statement.

An Austrian official statement, received here today, claims the failure of all attacks by the Russians in Volhynia. The Austro-German forces, according to the statement, have made progress north of Gorochow, near Socal, and in the vicinity of Kovel.

The Germans continue the attacking of the Russians north of the Pripiet marshes as far north as Dvinsk. They were repulsed everywhere in the Dvinsk sector. In front of Dubovka the Germans seized a portion of the Russian trenches and were ejected by Russian reinforcements which hastened up to the spot. South of Krivo the Germans crossed the Krovivansky River, but their progress was stopped by the Russian fire and they were forced back to the west bank.

Many Austrians when they retreated were cut off by the Russians north of Dubovka, on the Stripa River. They were seized with a panic, jumped into the stream, and were drowned, according to a despatch from Petrograd.

A despatch from Bucharest says that the Austrians have decided to evacuate Lemberg. They are also abandoning all southern Bukovina, according to information received at Bern from Vienna. Large Russian forces are being thrown across the Stripa River and great quantities of ammunition are being abandoned.

The Russian official statement of today follows:

"The Germans are violently bombarding the region of the Iskul bridgehead.

"On Wednesday night, following artillery preparation, the Germans took the offensive over the Iskul bridgehead. They were everywhere repulsed.

Drove Enemy Back.

"In the region in front of Dubovka, 12 miles south of Lake Vichnevo, the Germans, after intense artillery preparation, launched an offensive and seized a portion of our trenches. We hastened reinforcements to the scene and drove the enemy back to his own trenches.

South of Krivo the Germans crossed the River Krevilanka. Our fire prevented their further advance and drove them back to the west bank of the river.

On the Oginski Canal and Jasidol River there has been active fighting. During the course of the day our fire brought down two German aeroplanes within our lines. The aeroplanes were shot down south of the Bogor-Sodetz Railway and the other near the Jousk farm, ten versts southeast of the Oginski Canal. Both the machines were completely destroyed and their pilots killed.

Enemy Routed.

"In the region of Grudatza the enemy attacked in mass formation, but was put to flight, leaving on the ground numbers of killed and wounded.

In the region west of Sokol, on the Stripa, we repulsed by counter-attack a German offensive and captured about 800 prisoners, some machine guns. In the same region, our heavy artillery launched a series of attacks on the German positions.

In the region of Radost, on the Stokhod west of Svidnik and east of Vrontineh extremely violent fighting continues. We made use of prisoners of our troops, who refused quarter to the Germans who had been employing explosive bullets. In these attacks a brave detachment of territorial reserves from Yaroslav was wounded, but refused to quit the ranks.

On the Stripa west of Galovrenka our troops captured portions of the enemy's trenches.

We are continuing our pursuit of the enemy on the extreme left wing (in Bukovina). We have occupied Radost and taken an additional 22 officers and 1000 men and three machine guns and 27 packages of machine gun ammunition.

MEN GET INCREASE OFFICERS DO NOT

Hamilton Police Board Thinks Sergeants and Inspectors Get Enough.

WAS FATALLY INJURED

HAMILTON, Friday, June 23.—The appeal of the officers' men of the police force has been partly successful. At their meeting last night the commissioners decided that sergeants, detectives and inspectors were well paid and granted increases only to patrol sergeants and men in the ranks. It was decided to make a general increase of 60 a year in the salaries of the patrol sergeants and men.

Yesterday's casualty list was one of the largest that has been received here for some time as it contained 18 names, one of whom, Pte. R. E. Cook, North West street, has been killed at sea. Another Lance-Corporal Christian North, has died of wounds.

The appointment of George L. Sprague as principal of the technical school has been endorsed by the board of education. Technical and industrial education in this city has been in a serious state lately and the appointment has been made in the hope of making an improvement.

EXPRESS DELIVERY CAMPAIGN GOES ON

Suburbanites Decide to Hold Number of Mass Meetings.

BACKED BY COUNCIL

Controller Cameron Declares Efforts Will Be Successful.

A special meeting of the express and freight campaign executive committee was held last evening at the headquarters of the express and freight campaign, 100 York street, when the committee decided to give reasons why the association was organized. The principal thing should be to get down to ways and means.

"The railway board is your court," said the controller, "and in my opinion you are fighting the selfish interests of the transportation companies. We are a city with whom they are trading and they have no right to come and pick out the plums. They are like the street railway company, who makes its money on short hauls," said the controller.

Public opinion, he said, was the only thing that would arouse interest in their fight, and he believed their efforts would be crowned with success. "It is to be the city council's interest to see that you get the best counsel and that they decided should be done at yesterday's council meeting," concluded Controller Cameron.

Discrimination Charge.

Harry Newman, the next speaker, pointed out many cases in the district in which there was no delivery and where the residents were discriminated against.

The chairman congratulated the committee on the progress made since the beginning of the campaign. Over 250 names of prominent residents had already signed the petition. He suggested that the committee should visit the different sections of the city to arouse the enthusiasm of the citizens and to get the names of the residents.

GANG OF MEN ENGAGED ON THE NEW HIGHWAY

New Toronto Reeve Took Initiative and Ordered Work to Proceed.

Reeve Ironides of New Toronto yesterday took a drastic step when he ordered the Toronto-Hamilton highway commission and the York county council to proceed with the work of the Lake Shore road by putting a stop to the work of the gang of men who were engaged on the highway.

York County council yesterday did not favor the idea of the county commission to build the highway, but they did build over the Humber River at Bloor street and the big freight of March 18th, 1916, to the city of Toronto. They appointed three arbitrators to settle the dispute in section No. 12, Vaughan Township, over the selection of a school site near Elgin Mills.

RELIEF PROBLEM IN FRANCE COMPLEXED

Great Demand for Blankets, Sox and Women's and Children's Underwear.

Advice from an expert relief worker has been received by the Secours National regarding the situation in France, and he states that the relief problem in that country is more complexed than in Belgium.

In enumerating the articles which are most badly needed, he states that such as much in demand as ever in France at the present time, the demand for blankets and bed linen is far greater than the supply, he says, and in advising in this regard suggests that sheets and pillow cases should be of unbleached cotton, the stronger the better.

He points out that all Europe is economizing in surgical gauze, and asks that as much absorbent cotton and gauze as possible be sent. Among the other things that are needed are bed quilts, clothing, shoes and women's and children's underwear.

RUSSIAN STEAMER SUNK BY MINE IN BLACK SEA

Passenger Vessel Mercury Destroyed—Turk Ships Sent Down.

PETROGRAD, June 22.—A Russian official statement issued today says that the Black Sea mine torpedoes sank five large Russian vessels and a number of small ships with their crews, and a number of prisoners. The contact with an enemy mine and sank a majority of the passengers were saved.

The Mercury probably was the Russian steamer of that name, the home port of which was Odessa. She was a small steamship of 89 tons.
