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GERMAN GOVERNMENT PREPARES FOR FURTHER DISORDERS

DRURY WILL STICK BY EVERY MEMBER OF ONTARIO CABINET

Declaration at Woodstock Meeting — Real U. F. O. Work in Federal Field.

ADDRESSES THOUSAND

Woodstock, Ont., Jan. 14.—(Special.)—Addressing a thousand of the stalwart farmers of Oxford here tonight Premier Drury, concerning the prospect before his government, said that whether it lasted or not he would stick by every member of his cabinet to the last. This was the nearest reference he made to Hon. Mr. Drury. The real work before the U. F. O., he asserted, is to get clean and efficient government at Ottawa. He believed the people of Ontario desire to see the present government at Toronto get the job done. He showed whether it can make good. The occasion was a presentation to G. R. Green of the department of agriculture and his staff stock judging team, who brought in the winter fair. A cheque was presented to Mr. Green and gold watches to the three young members of the team, Messrs. Burns, McCord and Max Butcher and John Blair. Mayor Gahagan, in welcoming Premier Drury, assured him that cordial relations exist between urban and rural population in Oxford county.

Touches Fringe of Problem.
Premier Drury, who received Oxford county upon its interest in agricultural education, congratulated Ontario on the cabinet problem at once, declaring that the farmers of Ontario regarded the provincial election as a preliminary contest. Their real work is in the Dominion field. Personally he would have been very glad to have a government to some representative of the other parties. But the U. F. O. were the only party not to pick up the cabinet. He declared the government must be built up the basic industry of the province—agriculture. Rural population is decreasing. The standard of rural life is falling. If those conditions continue the hope and ideals of the original settlers must finally fall. Every farmer in the present cabinet carries his ancestry back to the original settlers and were themselves men devoted to the betterment of Ontario rural life. The provincial government cannot accomplish a reverse of conditions responsible for our rural life.
