Whereabouts of Father Gopon a Mystery, Tho it is Thought He is in Moscow.

With troops patrolling the streets of St. Petersburg. Moscow, Libau, Odessa, Kieff and other industrial centres of Russia, there were yesterday no serious collisions with strikers, In Moscow some of the employers are evincing a willingness to make some concessions to their workmen, but there has been no general agreement on that point. In St. Petersburg the return of workmen has enabled several factories to resume operations, and the authorities hope to witness a general resumption there on Monday. The minister of the interior has promised to consider the cases of the prominent writeers who were sent to the St. Petersburg fortress for their activity in the political and economic agitation, and he has given a qualified promise that they shall be released. THE SITUATION.

CANADA'S SEED WHEA NEEDED BY UNCLE SAM CONGRESS SO NOTIFIED

Secretary Shaw Recommends Passage of Law Granting Refund on Duty Paid by Yankees.

Washington, Jan. 26 .- (Special.) -- As predicted in these despatches, Secretary Shaw to-day sent to congress letters recommending the passage of a law that will permit him to refund duty paid on wheat for seed purposes. He calls atwheat for seed purposes. He calls attention to the act approved Jan. 15, 1908, which directed the secretary of the treasury to rerund duty paid on coal for the period of one year. This had the effect of temporarily removing the duty on coal. Secretary Shaw recommends a similar law to refund the duty paid on wheat actually used for seed under the rules and regulations prescribed by him.

Mr. Shaw thinks it would be impossible to allow wheat intended for seed to be entered free of duty. Such a provision would open the door to fraud,
