AT the meeting of the council yesterday afternoon an opinion was submitted by the city solicitor that the city was not liable for the claim of the Workmen's Compensation Board for an amount due by the Stephen Construction Co. a writ for which had been placed in the hands of Sheriff Wilson for collection. SACKVILLE, Aug. 17.—The third session of the Maritime summer school at Mount Allison University, Sackville, closed yesterday. One hundred and thirty-six students were in attendance, most of them from the three Maritime Provinces.

Professor J. T. Bender from Columbia University left for Halifax with Dr. H. E. Bigelow. They expect to motor through the Annapolis Valley

after which the former will take the Yarmouth boat to Boston. Professor Bender is delighted with his stay in the Maritimes. He expressed himself as finding the climate the best for summer work that he has ever experienced. He found the students who were studying Educational Administration and Educational Psychology with him, mature and of excellent ability. Their ranking in the examinations was consequently unusually high.

Professor Douglas Steel, who has been giving English courses, left yesterday for Saint John where he expects to spend some days with his brother, Percy J. Steel, and with his wife, Mrs. A. F. Robinson, who has given a remarkably interesting and helpful course in Kindergarten and Primary Work, is leaving for her home in Saint John.
