CONFUSED AS MARKET OPENS

Some Stocks Higher, Some Down at Start in Wall Street

Irregularly Marked Early Period in Montreal—Abitibi and Asbestos Strong Points

NEW YORK, March 25.—Confused price movements characterized the opening of today's stock market. Several high-priced issues, such as Mack Trucks, Woodworth-Cox Coals and General Electric, opened one to two points higher, while fresh liquidation took place in a number of the motors and other speculative industries. Hudson and Dodge Bros. each showed initial declines of one point. In view of yesterday's sharp reaction, which carried the industrial average to a new low level for the year, trading was of a nervous character.

MONTREAL MARKET. MONTREAL, March 25.—Trading on the Montreal stock exchange during the first half hour this morning was more or less active and prices opened irregularly, with several fractional gains and losses recorded. Abitibi and Asbestos were the strong points, each being up a point, the former being marked up on the board at 15½, and Asbestos at 90. Smelters and Bralor were again the most active issues. Smelters opened irregularly with a half point gain at 19½, selling at 19½ a little later, and declining a half at 19½, around 7:30 o'clock. Bralor was firm at 89½. Asbestos preferred was the weak spot, opening at 68 for a loss of one point, but very little trading was done in this issue. Other changes included: Alcohol, down one-

Morning Stock Letter

NEW YORK, March 25.—Liquidation was on a large scale yesterday and prices declined two to five points, with more sensational losses in some of the high priced specialties. The backbone of the decline is well covered by the Times this morning, which says: "The factors most prominent may thus be enumerated: The break in the market on March 2 and 3, which left many financial cripples in its wake, who have been merely hanging on since that time; the firming up of money, due to heavy banking withdrawal in the last few days, resulting in a rate of 3½ per cent for call loans; The announcement of an investigation of mergers of oil companies by the attorney general, which has continued for nine weeks; and report from the iron and steel trade center that present business is not sufficient in volume to keep the plants running during April at the high rates maintained in the last few days, and, finally, the news that there has been some moderate curtailment in

U. S. LYNCHINGS IN 1926 NUMBERED 17

Committee of Federal Council of Churches Declares Mob Law Arrogant

WASHINGTON, March 25.—Seventeen persons—all negroes—were lynched in the United States during 1925, an increase of one over the record for 1924, the Federal Council of Churches set forth yesterday in its annual report on the subject.  
The report was prepared by the council's committee on race relations and the committee in an accompanying statement declared "mob law has been thrown down the gauntlet to the churches and all other organizations standing for law and order and justice through the courts."  
Two unusual events were recorded in 1925. Texas for the first year since the beginning of records in 1882 being free of lynching and Utah having its first occurrence of the kind since 1884.
