

JACK RENAULT EXTENDED TO BEAT SECOND RATE MONTREALER

CHAMPION IS KNOCKED DOWN IN THE SECOND

Report Roy Mitchell Is Matched To Box Winner

MONTREAL, Oct. 22.—Jack Ward, second-rate local colored boxer with brief experience forced Jack Renault, Canadian heavyweight champion, to the limit to win a decision over his challenger in a ten-round bout here last night. Both men were knocked down, Ward twice and Renault once. Roy Mitchell, colored Halifax boxer, will probably meet Renault now.

Ward was handicapped by lack of experience. He has been fighting around Montreal only during the last several years, while Renault has had the advantage of clever management and many big fights.

Renault, on his showing against Soldier Jones in his last fight here, was made an odds on choice and few believed Ward would last more than four or five rounds. Indeed when the champion floored him in the first with a hard right, it looked as though his stay in the ring would be even shorter, but the colored boxer scrambled to his feet and displaying unexpected courage remained on them until the going sounded. From the beginning of the second round to the finish, Ward fought more carefully and at times returned punch for punch with his opponent. He crested things in the second round by knocking the champion down with a blow at his solar plexus. But Renault was up again in an instant and at his opponent with a rush. Ward, however, was not to be caught napping and his clever avoidance of Renault's attack earned him the round.

In the fifth round Renault floored Ward for the second time, but the colored fighter quickly recovered and was exchanging blows with the champion when the sixth round ended. The sixth round found Ward more than holding his own and he landed several lefts to Renault's face and chin that forced the latter to break ground.

In the other rounds, however, the champion held the advantage over Ward, displaying the more finished style and landing more frequently. Ward weighed 197½ and Renault 204½.

Before the fight, Fulton pulled a diamond ring off his finger and asked a 24-hour acquaintance to hold it until after the contest. The acquaintance, Fulton says, did a sneak while he was unconscious on the floor of the ring, and has not been seen since. The ring was valued at \$1,500.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 22.—Harry F. Morrison, boxing promoter, announced today that negotiations were "virtually completed" for a bout on Thanksgiving Day between Phil Rosenberg, world's bantamweight champion, and the winner of tonight's bout here between Abe Goldstein and Chuck Helman.

WESTER, N. Y., Oct. 22.—Stranger Lewis successfully defended his title here last night, against Pat McGill, Irish grappler. McGill won the first fall in twenty minutes, Lewis coming back to win the next two with his favorite head lock.

N. H. L. ANNUAL IS SET FOR NOV. 7

Ottawa Opposes Pittsburgh's Inclusion Into The League This Year.

MONTREAL, Oct. 22.—November 7 in Montreal, has been definitely set as the date for the annual meeting of the National Hockey League, according to an announcement made by President Frank Calder.

Important questions will be considered at the conference this fall, and not the least important will be those referring to changes in the rules. At the meeting held recently in New York the question of an anti-defence rule, which would permit only two players to be behind their own blue line, ahead of the puck, was discussed as was a proposed change which would limit the width of the goal keeper's pads. It is anticipated that both these rules will be accepted by the league, and embodied in the code for the 1925-26 season.

Then the question of admitting New York and Pittsburgh to the circuit will come up for ratification. New York's road to a berth in the league, is clear, but from Ottawa comes opposition to the inclusion of Pittsburgh. However, though there may be some objections raised, it has been intimated that as the league is practically committed to admitting the Pittsburgh club, the action of the directors at the New York gathering will be ratified even if the constitution of the league has to be altered to overcome the obstacles in the way of Pittsburgh's entrance.

Arctic Police Post Planned By Mounties

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 22.—The world's most northerly post, also the most remote of any bureau habitation, is to be constructed next year for the Royal Canadian Mounted Police at the far end of Ellesmere Island.

Building materials and two year supplies have been cached within easy freighting distance of the point. Men will be detailed for patrol duty on the lonely shores of Foul Strait.
