Prices Move Within Narrow
and Irregular Limits in
Wall Street

MAIN TREND OF PRICES DOWNWARD

Brazilian and Abitibi Are
Least Inactive on Mon-
treal Exchange

NEW YORK, Nov. 21.—Stock prices moved within narrow margin and irregular limits at the opening of today's market, but reactionaries tendencies predominated. American Tobacco opened a point higher and Hudson Motors, Dupont and May Department Stores each showed initial losses of a point or so.

MONTREAL MARKET.

MONTREAL, Nov. 21.—Trading was dull with no important price changes at the opening of today's stock market. The least inactive stock was Brazilian, which eased 1-4 to 73 1/4. Abitibi followed with a loss of 1-2 to 68. Montreal Power lost 1-4 to 207, while Shawinigan, in a small lot transaction, advanced a similar fraction to 160 1/2. Asbestos preferred, National Breweries, Consolidated Smelters and Laurentide sold the same at 116, 51, 130 and 78 respectively. The strong spot was Lake of the Woods, which rose 3 to 175 in small sale.

NEW YORK, Nov. 21.—We expected a rally yesterday and today. The selling, however, developed before the close yesterday and the market closed weak. There was no news to cause the selling. So far most stocks have met good support at various points—Steel at 123, for instance. Should steel break through 128 we would take it as an indication that it will go considerably lower. In fact the market does not show much response to rallies. We still would use rallies to get out of stocks. However, some stocks can go higher. Some days ago we said C. O. could go against the stock trend. It did, and we believe it will go considerably higher. In the same way, we believe Sloss can go against the current and eventually we expect it to sell 20 to 30 points higher. Cons Gas is another issue which we believe will go higher.

Low C. N. Rate Upon Grain to East Is Urged

WINNIPEG, Nov. 20.—The Free Press in a leader today urging the use of Maritime ports for grain carriage, says:

"R. C. Vaughan, of the Canadian National Railway, declared to the convention on Wednesday that the Canadian National Railway System would work itself out of its difficulties if a lot of dead goods were not unloaded on it. It cannot by any stretch of the imagination be argued that putting in a low grain rate from Armstrong to the Maritime ports via the Transcontinental would be a dead dog. Grain has been hauled profitably this way at a very low rate."

"If the directors are sincere in this they might well put a low through rate into effect at the head of the lakes and in the interior elevators when navigation closes next month. Few seasons will be so favorable to testing out the Transcontinental as a grain route this winter."
