CRERAR MEETING IN FREDERICTON IS CALLED OFF

Some Mixup in His Arrange-
ments—News of the Cam-
paign.

Fredricton, N. B., Oct. 26.—(Staff
Correspondent Canadian Press).—The
second meeting of the Progressive cam-
paign in the Maritime Provinces has been
called off. Hon. T. A. Crerar arrived
here this afternoon to address the elec-
tors of York-Sunbury but found there
had been a misunderstanding. The meet-
ing had not been advertised and there was
some mix up in the dates.
Arrangements are being made for a
meeting in Fredericton next week on Mr.
Crerar's return from P. E. Island. Pro-
gressive expect to have fifteen Progres-
sives in the Maritime provinces field.
Nine in Nova Scotia, four in New Brun-
swick and two in Prince Edward Island.
Sherbrooke, Que., Oct. 26.—The former
progressive party was organized at Len-
noxville last evening. Some 200 people
were present. It is practically assured
that the farmers of the county of Sher-
brooke will form a strong organization.

Green, of Waterville, waterways en-
gineer, arrived here last evening to con-
sult with the provincial government re-

the outlet of Grand and Long lakes.
This matter was taken up with Col.
T. G. Loggie, D.S.O., deputy minister
of lands and mines, this morning, but no
definite decision given. It will be re-
ferred to the federal government before



HURRICANE SWEEPS OUT OVER OCEAN

Washington, Oct. 26.—A tropical
storm which has swept the Florida pen-
insula for the last thirty-six hours,
passed out into the Atlantic ocean last
night, between St. Augustine and
Titusville, according to reports received
early today by the weather bureau.
Gales will be experienced off the At-
lantic south of Cape Henry for several
hours, the bureau said, although the
storm, after leaving the land, appears
to be moving in a northeasterly direc-
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
