OPINIONS DIFFER ON BIG LEAGUE PLANS

Ban Johnson Suggests Closing on August 20, With World's Series Not so, Says Barney Dreyfus

Chicago, July 29—Closing the major league schedule about August 30 and staging the world's series immediately thereafter, is the plan suggested tonight by President Ban Johnson, of the American League to comply with Secretary Baker's work or fight order.

Pittsburgh, July 29—The National League will not consent to a plan to stop playing on August 30, so that a world's series may be played, said President Dreyfus, of the Pittsburgh club, and who was recently selected by the National League to confer with American League representatives on the question of selecting dates for the series.

"We plan to play until Labor Day, regardless of what the American League does," said Mr. Dreyfus.

FISHING COMPANIES ON THE BLACKLIST

Windsor, Ont., July 30—Three wholesale fishing companies have been officially blacklisted by the Canada Food Board.

The companies are alleged to have exported government fish in excess of the 1,000 pounds per month which is allowed. The names have not been made public.

Rigid Economy Needed. Ottawa, July 30—That rigid economy and the elimination of waste in the consumption of all foodstuffs must be continued throughout all countries to guarantee against harvest failure and the possibility of having to import large military drafts from America to Europe, forms the substance of a resolution passed by the food controllers of Great Britain, United States, France and Italy and forwarded to the Canada Food Board at Ottawa today.

Thirty Killed By Explosion In Japan

London, July 30—Thirty persons were killed and sixty others injured by an explosion of munitions at Shimono, Japan, on Saturday, says a Central News despatch from Tokyo.

The munitions were being transported from the railroad station at Shimono to barges in the harbor. They blew up while a crowded train was standing in the station.

THE CHICAGO MARKETS Chicago, July 30—Corn developed weakness today, influenced by better weather and by reports that relations between Turkey and Germany had become severed.

Openings prices, which ranged from 1-8 to 4-8 lower with August \$1.22 and September \$1.53-5-8 to \$1.53-3-4 were followed by a further setback and then by a moderate reaction. Oats went down grade with corn. Larger receipts from the new crop tended also to depress the market. After opening 1-8 to 3-8 down, prices continued to weaken.

The strength of the hog market rallied provisions. At 10 o'clock it declined and taken place in sympathy with grain.

MAY RUN MOTOR BUS FROM INDIANTOWN

Citizens of Indian town are complaining about the street car service and say that they are so disgusted with it that they are contemplating having a "bus service" inaugurated. They contend that they frequently have to wait from fifteen to twenty minutes for a car. Plans for securing a motor bus and starting a regular service from Indian town to the city are being discussed and already promises of substantial backing have been given.

NO WEAKENING AS WAR ENTERS THE FIFTH YEAR

Earl Curzon Reviews Achievements and Discusses Future—Development of Imperial War Cabinet of Great Importance

London, July 30.—(Via Reuters' Ottawa Agency)—Earl Curzon, speaking at a banquet at Gray's Inn last evening, said that at the beginning of the fifth year of the war, the purpose of the nation and the government showed no weakening, abatement or modification.

The speaker, contending, emphasized the fact of the initiative and the importance of the offensive and the importance of the prestige of the enemy troops, although it was early to imagine that the enemy would be beaten.

The Allied forces had found a genius in General Foch, Earl Curzon said.

Great Britain, during the war, had been the feeder, clothier, banker and almost universal provider of all the Allies. The supreme efforts of France would have been impossible except for Great Britain, and therefore, in view of this service, it was remarkable that our armies were not so small, but so large.

The speaker stated that Sir Robert Borden had reaffirmed Canada's determination to Great Britain's mighty efforts which had not been given sufficient publicity. During four years she had raised 8,000,000 men. Britain's army was the greatest in the field of the Allies, and it was the only country which, in war, had increased her food production.

Her achievements had been done silently with characteristic calmness and dignity.

TRAIN WAS ROBBED. Charlottesville, Va., July 30—An express car on a west-bound Chesapeake & Ohio passenger train passing through here early today was robbed by an unidentified white man, who bound and gagged Express Messenger Marshall of Washington. The safe was emptied of all valuables.

OLDEST ODDFELLOW DEAD. St. Catharines, Ont., July 30—Richard Peterson, aged 81 a resident of St. Catharines for 30 years, and the oldest Oddfellow in Canada, died here yesterday.

FIGHTING THE TUSOCK MOTH. Frederickton Gloucester—The tussock moth situation is becoming more serious as the days go by. They are now bringing the houses in the infected tracts, and have, in many cases, gone to the houses along Westmorland street on Saturday night, citizens went out with torches and all kinds of weapons.

RECENT DEATHS. The death of Mrs. John Thompson occurred at her home, Aberdeen, Wash., on Tuesday. She was a daughter of the late Wm. Lockhart of the Barony, N. B. Besides her husband she leaves two sons, William A., somewhere in France, and Allan E. of the U. S. navy; also an aged mother, one sister, Mrs. Thomas Thompson, and three brothers, David Lockhart of Hingham, Wash., and George and James of the Barony.

INDIANS PROTEST. Brantford, Ont., July 30—The six nations Indians have sent J. W. Bowley, K.C. to Ottawa to present a memorial to the Dept. of the Interior. The memorial constitutes a protest against the registration law and also against the surveillance of the Indian department. Attached to the memorial are photographs of two wampum belts commemorating the treaty.

Round Up Alien Enemies. Montreal, July 30—Captain Carter, registrar of alien enemy subjects for the Montreal district, announced this morning that plans had been perfected for a round-up of all citizens of enemy countries. Each, it is said, will be either interned or deported, having arrived the conclusion that the time has reached to put an end to any possibility of wide spread enemy activity. The decision follows closely upon the suppression of a Bolshevik meeting here last week.

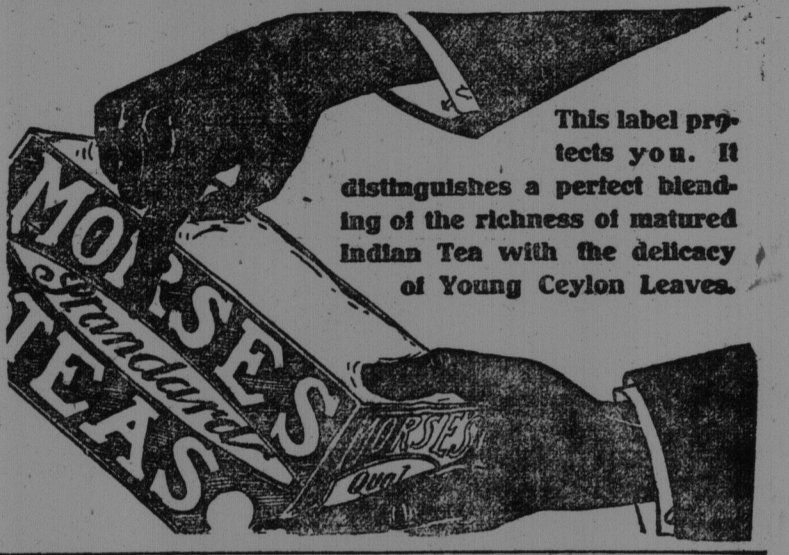
