RED SOX WON SENSATIONAL MATCH, 2 TO 1

New York, Oct. 11.—The Boston Red Sox, pennant winners of the American League, were victors today over the New York National League champions by a score of 3 to 1 in the fourth game of the world's series.

"Smoky Joe" Wood shone today. The Red Sox players fairly hugged their star

homer as he walked from the playing field with his second victory. Gray's den clouds screened the sun and in the murky atmosphere Wood's speed ball whizzed home with the Giants batting. Only once was a Giant batter able to gauge the Boston man's curve for a hit, when a hit meant a run.

Wood Struck Out Eight.

The infield was wet from a night's rain and Wood stood on the hurling mound for nine innings with a pile of swatting beside him to dry the ball before each delivery to the plate. His service was without blemish or flaw, not one man being passed while eight Giants walked to the plate and then walked back again, after vainly trying to ride the riddle of the Boston box man's mystifying drop ball and fast inshoots.

Wood was only in trouble in two innings, in the sixth and again in the seventh, when the home club's only run came over the plate. The sixth showed Wood at his best. "Corney" habbed a hit to left and Devore bounced a drive off Wood's ankle for a base before anyone was out. The stands were wild with excitement and tried to rattle the Boston pitcher, but Wood was as cool as a Labrador iceberg in March. He caused Larry Doyle to pop out and then fed Snodgrass and Murray on quick-breaking down shoots, making those Giants hitters end weak rollers to the Red Sox infield.

Boston broke into the run column in the second when Gardner tripled and scored on Tarsan's wild heave of a moist ball. The second run came in the fourth when Stahl reached first on a forced hit, stole second went to third on an infield out and home on Cady's long fly.

Boston made its third run in the ninth. Gardner singled, was sacrificed to second by Stahl, took third on an infield out and tallied on Joe Wood's single.

The Giants' only run was scored in the seventh by Herros on one single to centre and Fletcher's two bagger to right-field.

A New York boy broke the hearts of the Giant partisans. He is Heine Wagner, the Red Sox shortstop, whose plays today robbed the Giants of a hit.

Two of his stops of smashes over second were made with one hand on the dead run, then, half turned, he heaved his arm to throw to first base ahead of the runners by a step.

Wagner's Sensational Catch.

With one run needed to tie in the eighth, Devore lashed a grounded ball, sped by second base, for a hit meant a good start for the final rally. Wagner, fleet Devore was cut by inches. The ball glowed hand and snapped the ball to first without recovering his balance. Fletcher's two bagger to right-field.

Yerkes and Fletcher also started in field-plays, while Murray habbed a home of a three-base hit at the beginning of the fifth. Running back to the concrete wall the Giant rightfielder leaped into the air and clutched the ball.

Tarsan did not stride into his pitching stride until the Red Sox had made two runs. After that he tightened up and in the fifth, sixth and seventh innings turned the Boston back in one-two-three or two. The most ball finger was taken cut only to allow a pinch hitter to bat for him.

With today's game the players cease to share in the world's excitement. The four games played netted them \$147,572.28, breaking the record established by the New York and Philadelphia clubs last year, when the players' share amounted to \$127,910.61. The winning players this year will receive \$8,543.27, and the losing players, \$50,028.90. Individually each of the winners is due to receive approximately \$4,000, and the losers about \$2,500.

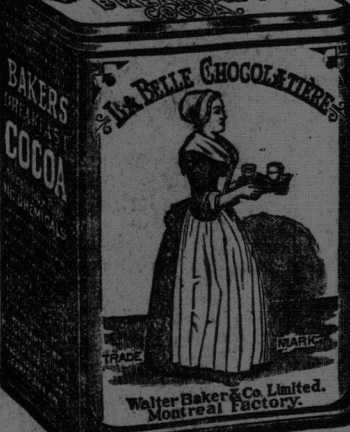

Frankfort-on-the-Main, five; Hamburg three; Dusseldorf, Breslau, Karlsruhe, Heilbronn, and Rhd. Elster, each two; while other places have one each. Most of the women doctors in Germany practice as specialists, especially in diseases of women and children. During the last few years, the chances of medical women have steadily become more favorable in Germany. They often secure posts in hospitals, institutes, and asylums.

Despite the statements that have appeared regarding the health of the German Emperor, it is said on good authority that His Majesty is very far from well, and a further breakdown is feared unless he is very careful. The emperor's recent attack has left him with a cough which, if not nearsighted, is certainly a nuisance. When mounting his horse the sprightliness and ease with which he formerly got into the saddle is missing. Clearly the limbs are still somewhat stiff, and the emperor's face is somewhat drawn as if he was subject to occasional twinges of pain.

A House of 600 Rooms.

Berlin has a new toy, a truly colossal canvasary modelled on the lines of the "great department stores" of New York. It is a building of "sky-scrapers" to Germany, instead of shooting up forty or fifty stories into the air, the builders of the "Boarding Palace" in Karlsruhe have spread it over an enormous area. Nothing in town is nearly so "kolossal" except the police presidency in Alexander Platz, which is a district by itself. The "Boarding Palace" hopes to end the misery of homeless families and bachelors who have hitherto had to content themselves with precarious existence in a German "pension." It has six hundred rooms with baths, enormous restaurants, coffee-rooms, grills and "American bars," and includes a full-fledged sanatorium and Turkish bath "parlor" among its other attractions. In tune with the tastes of the New Berlin, the interior is the last word in overdone ornateness and gaudiness. For the moment the "Boarding Palace" outshines the royal castle and the Hohenzollern Museum as a "sight," and all Berlin is flocking to see it.

For cases of suicide could be more abundant than that of a subordinate government employee and heaped husband, who cut his throat in a wood on the outskirts of Berlin on Tuesday. "At the wish of my wife," he wrote on a paper that was found by him, "I am going to get out of her way. Then she may thank Providence on bended knee that I have done so. A last farewell to my children, but my wife—petition take her!"

A parallel to this case, in which acquiescence and revolt are so strongly mixed, is found in the recent suicide of a Potsdam bricklayer, who wrote, just before shooting himself—"My mother gave me a silly name, so I have shot myself." His comrades had been teasing him on account of his strange Christian name.

The Suffragettes

A propaganda of violence is promised by the militant Suffragettes during the winter, and Mrs. Pankhurst and her army of political amazons seem to be more determined than ever. A big demonstration is to be held at the Albert Hall this month, and 10,000 seats have already been sold, and a large sum of money is expected to be realized. Mrs. Pankhurst is confident in the fact that her party, aided by the powerful support promised, will become a greater force than ever in British political life.

Some Radium Stories

From Birmingham it is stated that a doctor has lost \$500 worth of radium by throwing it into a fire among bandages. It is further said that chemist had promised to recover it from the ashes. This is by no means the first time that the precious metal has been lost and recovered. The metal itself has never been seen, excepting in Mme. Curie's crystal tubes. What is known as "radium" is a radium salt, either radium bromide or radium chloride, or even radium sulphate. Tiny grains of these salts are extremely precious, and are usually sealed in little glass bulbs. Nowadays some of these glass bulbs are used for treating skin diseases, and as a rule their contents are spread over cloth or other surfaces and fitted on to "applicators."

When one of the first little glass bulbs was received in London it had a curious history. A physician in Portland-place was applying it to a patient when he inadvertently let it fall, and a moment later crashed under his foot. The carpet was very valuable; so was the sole of his foot; but the radium salt far more valuable than both together. In fact, the value of radium is not easily reckoned in dollars and cents. A small portion of it in the hands of those who can sell or buy, but by the greater quantity is beyond the reach of the merely wealthy. Gold may control its own day—not yet. The value to the physician was, therefore, very great. He took off the foot, and cut out the square of his carpet. He had both burned, and out of the ashes refined the original grain of radium. This has been a new "applicator" and is in use today.

Greek Torpedo Boats at Algiers.

Algiers, Oct. 11.—One of the Greek torpedo boats destroyed recently purchased in England and which was supposed to have sailed for Philadelphia, arrived here today and three others will arrive tonight.

DENY PROFITING IN THE MARCONI WIRELESS CONTRACT

London, Oct. 11.—A heated debate on the British government's contract with the Marconi Wireless Company for the establishment of an imperial wireless service took place today in the house of commons.

Attorney General Sir Rufus Isaacs, Post Master General Herbert Samuel and Chancellor of the Exchequer David Lloyd George denied emphatically that they had profited by the government's contract with Marconi. Several newspapers had demanded an investigation and had strongly hinted that corruption underlay the establishment of an imperial wireless service.

Several members of parliament attacked the government for making a contract without giving other wireless systems a chance to tender for it. A committee has been appointed to investigate the matter.

Chief Justice Moss Dead.

Toronto, Oct. 11.—Sir Charles Moss, chief justice of the court of appeal for Ontario, died tonight, aged 72 years.

TO SOUTH AMERICA.

Toronto, Oct. 11.—Colonel H. W. Massey, who for the last four years has been chief secretary of the Salvation Army in Canada, has been appointed territorial commander of the Salvation Army in South America, with headquarters at Buenos Ayres. Colonel Massey will be leaving Toronto in two weeks.
