MEIGHEN KEPT THE DOOR SHUT

Hidden From Callers This Morning.

News of the Filling of Vacancies Expected From Time to Time—Election Activities in Various Parts of Canada.

Ottawa, Sept. 16.—This morning the premier was secluded from callers and no information was obtainable in regard to the appointments, cabinet or otherwise.
The name of Dr. L. P. Normand, Mayor of Three Rivers, has been mentioned as a cabinet possibility.
Announcement of appointments to the senate and to vacant judgeships will probably be made intervals for some time to come.
Lieut.-Col. J. W. Margeson, member of the board of pension commissioners for Canada was offered the nomination as government candidate for West Ottawa last night. He has not decided.
Montreal, Sept. 16.—Hon. Mr. Taschereau, premier of Quebec, will be a speaker at a banquet to Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux here on September 22. The full list of speakers so far is: Sir Lomer Gouin, chairman; Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberal opposition; Ernest Lapointe, M. P. for Quebec East, and Hon. Mr. Lemieux, whose entry into parliament twenty-five years ago, is being feted.

Bennet as Independent.
Calgary, Sept. 16.—It was definitely announced here last night that R. B. Bennett, K. C., would not accept the nomination of the Conservative party in West Calgary, but would run as an independent. This was accepted as definite evidence that Mr. Bennett has refused a place in the Meighen cabinet.
Winnipeg, Sept. 16.—A petition is being signed in Manitoba, Manitoba, with the object of getting Hon. Robert Rogers, former minister of public works, to run as candidate in Lisgar, according to the Free Press. Mr. Rogers declined to say whether or not he would accept. Ferris Bolton, Unionist, is the present incumbent.
R. B. Russell, H. M. Bartholomew and Charles Stewart were last night nominated as candidates of the Winnipeg branch of the Socialist party in Sandhead in the three Winnipeg federal constituencies.

Ontario Liberal Rally.
Toronto, Sept. 16.—The Liberal political bazaar in Toronto will be opened with the biggest guns in West Toronto on Tuesday evening, Sept. 20. This meeting was originally planned for the West York by election, but now it is to be the rally call for Liberalism throughout the province. Accompanying Hon. Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberal party, will be Hon. W. S. Fielding, minister of finance in the Laurier government.

Labour Statement.
Kingston, Ont., Sept. 16.—Addressing a fair sized audience of labor men here last night, Jas. Simpson of Toronto, secretary of the Ontario branch of the Canadian Labor Party, defended the amalgamation of agricultural and industrial classes. Referring to the argument that a government formed of these two classes would be class legislation, he said that Canada had had nothing but class legislation for decades after decades, the workers being practically without representation while the legislators of the country legislated in the interest of the classes as against the masses.
Mr. Simpson said that the government decided to make the tariff the issue but labor intended to fight the election on the issue of unemployment. He said that a high tariff would provide employment, were there so many unemployed? Exports had fallen off, but how could the government hope to increase employment by a high protective wall? If the government shut out goods from other countries would not these countries shut out goods from Canada? Labor was not for free trade, but it was against the Canadian Manufacturers' Association which, he said, was exploiting the consumers of this country.

Sherbrooke.
Sherbrooke, Que., Sept. 16.—On Sept. 20, a convention of the Liberal Association of the county of Sherbrooke will be held, and it is expected that nearly sixty delegates will attend. The object of the meeting will be to choose a Liberal candidate for Sherbrooke. It is probable that F. W. McCrea, who has represented the county at Ottawa since 1911, will be the unanimous choice. On the evening of the 23rd, Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King will address a rally. He will probably be accompanied by Sir Lomer Gouin, Hon. Walter Mitchell and others.

TWENTY YEARS IS SENTENCE

Montreal, Sept. 16.—Dominique Capoli, an Italian, was today sentenced to twenty years in the penitentiary for the attempted murder of Luigi Martini, the fellow countryman, on Aug. 16 last. The judge said it was high time the foreigners of Montreal were taught a lesson.

MORE TRAFFIC CASES IN COURT

A large number of traffic cases occupied the attention of the police magistrates again this morning. Police Magistrate Dykeman distinguished himself as a prosecuting attorney and put up a good fight though he lost his case. Percy Hunter, reported by Police Magistrate Dykeman for driving past a standing street car, was fined \$10. Maurice Green, reported by Police Magistrate Dykeman for driving on the wrong side of the street also was fined \$10. R. S. Dykeman, reported by Police Magistrate Quinlan for taking on passengers at a white pole was fined and ordered to stand. John Walker, reported by Police Magistrate Storey, was fined for allowing passengers to stand on the steps of his bus. Percy Slattery, reported by Police Magistrate Storey for not having the rear lights of his auto burning was fined \$25 and the fine allowed to stand. Joseph Hunter was allowed to go on a charge of stopping street car No. 86 at the intersection of two streets. The charge was made by Police Magistrate Howard for stopping at a white pole. John Quinley, reported by Police Magistrate Howard for having more than one passenger on the front seat with him, pleaded guilty to the charge and was fined. Motorman Landry, charged with stopping his car at the intersection of two streets pleaded guilty, but contended he was justified in so doing. He was represented by H. H.
