Dublin, Sept. 16—Premier Lloyd George is blamed by the Freeman's Journal for the cancellation of the proposed Inverness conference. "Lloyd George," the newspaper declares, "made an extravagant misconstruction in cancelling the conference on the ground that to confer on the terms of Mr. De Valera's note would be to recognize Ireland as an independent republic free to disassociate herself from the empire. It should be remembered that Ireland, many years ago, was a sovereign state within the empire and reclaiming that sovereignty does not necessarily imply dissociation and severance.

"The British and Irish people will refuse to accept this as the end of efforts toward peace. Letter writing has continued too long. The negotiators long ago should have met at the conference table and got busy framing the peace terms, instead of discussing theometical objections to such a meeting. It is not yet too late for the adoption of such a course."

"The masses of both countries," the

and of counter notes. Let plenipotentiaries of England and Ireland meet with
absolutely open minds and without any
conditions whatsoever. This is probably what will eventually happen. Neither would be prejudiced in such a conference, and, with good will, a settlement
should be reached."
