On motion by Mr. BRYDGES, seconded by Rev. R. LINDSAY, the first six on each list were elected respectively Trustees and Members of Council.

Rev. F. H. CLAYTON moved, seconded by Mr. DARIUS ADAMS:

That this Synod do employ a reporter, and exclude or not recognize any other.

It was moved in amendment by Dr. Sullivan, seconded by Mr. Brydges,

That a committee consisting of the Clerical and Lay Secretaries, with Mr. T. White, be requested to make the necessary arrangements for the reporting of the proceedings of Synod.

Rev. Mr. Clayton's motion was withdrawn, and Rev. Dr. Sullivan's put and carried.

Rev. Dr. Sullivan moved, seconded by Mr. Garth,

That a committee be appointed to devise some more just and equitable method of electing lay representatives to the Synod of this diocese than that provided in Article 4 of the Constitution, the said committee to report to next meeting of the Synod.—Carried, 71 to 58.

The CHANCELLOR asked permission to move, seconded by Mr. L. H. DAVIDSON,

That the Canon printed on page 161 of the report of the Executive Committee be adopted and passed as a Canon of this Synod.—Carried.

It shall be the duty of every rector or other incumbent in this diocese to furnish to the Executive Committee, on or before the first day of November in each and every year, a true, faithful and exact statement in detail, signed by such rector or incumbent, of any and all endowments and trusts held in favor of the parish or mission of such rector or incumbent, or in favor of any particular church or chapel or for the general purposes of the Church of England and Ireland, within such parish or mission, and of the mode in which each such endowment is invested, and of its exact condition at the time such statement is furnished.—Carried.

The Rev. Mr. Moratkhan then addressed the Synod on the object of his visit to this country, namely, to raise funds for the erection of a school in Kurdistan.

The BISHOP read letters from the Archbishop of Canterbury and others in favour of the object in which the reve-
