

DENOUNCES MIDWAYS.

Country Fair Directors Giva Them To Much Place, Says Wilson.

TORONTO, Feb. 6.-The growing tendency on the part of boards of di-rectors of the fall exhibitions of the Province of Ontario to regard the midway and its accompaniments as a necessary institution at their annual fairs was roundly denounced by J. Lockie Wilson, superintendent of fairs and exhibitions, supermember of nars and exhibitions, at the annual meet-ing of the Ontario association held yesterday. "The midway seems to be recognized as a necessary evil at our larger fairs, and even the smallest larger fairs, and even the smallest fairs are now trying to give place to such an attraction," said Mr. Wilson. "The first idea of these fairs should be to educate the people of the com-munity rather than degrade them. Supt. Wilson expressed satisfaction with the fact that this past year only fifty-three societies applied for wet weather insurance as provided by law, as against one hundred and six for 1911. 

Simmons, Frankfort, alluded to the necessity for still greater sums being set apart for exhibition purposes, and made some cogent observations on the labor situation. They Admit Heavy Casualties in Fighting in Gallipoli. DEFENDERS IN RETREAT Freed From That Weak, Lan-Bulgarian Forces Have Been Victor guid, Always Tired Feelious All Along the Line In the In-

vasion of Peninsula and Have Burned All the Military Buildings at Rodosto - European Ambassadors In Conference.

Ambassadors in Conference. LONDON, Feb. 7.—A Constantinople despatch to The Daily News says that heavy fighting has been going on for two days in Gallipoli, and that the Bulgarians have won all along the line. The Turks, on their own admis-sion, have lost 5,000 men. The fighting began on Tuesday. The Bulgars advanced from Kadikeui towards Kavak, which the Turks oc-cupied. The fight lasted until evening, when the Turks retired to Bulair. An-other Bulgar force on the Marmora coast occupied Myriophyto. It is reported that the Bulgars be-fore leaving Rodosto burned all the military buildings. The grand vizier, Mahmoud Schef-ket Pasha, in his recent visit to the front, is understood to have met Gen. Savoff, but nothing came of the in-terview. The main hody of the Turkieb




