Lecture by Mr. John Weir

On Tuesday night, Sept. 7th, a very interesting lecture was given in the Public Building by Mr. John Weir, of the Halifax School for the Blind. Canon Field presided and introduced the speaker as a Newfoundlander, and before the meeting closed those who had the pleasure of listening to his remarks must have felt he was a credit to his native land. His remarks were based on the question as to how we, as a people, are to help the blind of this country.

He first told of the origin of the Halifax institution in 1869, by Mr. Wm. Murdock, who gave \$20,000 towards it. With the help of some others he opened it in 1871. It was then a small building; now it has increased to five large ones with a large number of students from Nova Scotia, P. E. Island and Newfoundland, irrespective of class, creed or colour, with up-to-date equipment for educating them, so that when they graduate from the school they go forth to face the battle of life feeling they can compete favorably with any man who has the sense of sight.

They have two courses of training, the first, children from 6 to 21 years, where they are taught the same lessons as children who can see, except by a different method called the Braille Method. Then the adults are taught trades, such as making baskets, brooms, mops, brushes, mattresses, rugs, carpets, tuning pianos and organs, resetting cane bottom chairs and many other things which really seemed marvellous for those who could not see.

He referred to the many lonely

hours those who sit in their homes must spend with no education or occupation. It is to lessen that loneliness and make life worth living for the many who are deprived of their sight that the Institution was started. But the workers and the work cannot go on without funds, so the appeal was made to all who can see in Newfoundland to give a thank-offering for the blessing of sight. We have to help the 140 of our brothers and sisters on our Island who are deprived of that blessing. The lantern slides were also very interesting, showing School for the Blind, Braille Alphabet, Kindergarten Class, Geography Class, Men at their Trades, Boating on the Pond, Knitting for Soldiers, Nfld. No. 1 Aeroplane, Nfld. No. 1 Machine Gun and a splendid picture of Superintendent, Mr. Fraser.

In speaking of him, Mr. Weir said he was a man of sterling worth; a man he felt it an honor to work with; a man whose work King George recognized, and on his last birthday conferred on him the honor of Knighthood. At the close of the address Capt. Eli Daws moved a vote of thanks, and Rev. Mr. Jackson, of Clarke's Beach, seconded the motion, which was carried unanimously. The National Anthem brought a very interesting and instructive meeting to a close.

Retrenching

London, Sept. 2.—The first step in the movement for retrenchment in Government expenses, the Express announces, is the dismissal of 1,700 employees of the Lands Valuation Department, created under the budget of 1909, to make a complete valuation of all land in Great Britain preliminary to the taxation of unearned increment.

Serbia Concedes

Paris, Sept. 1.—The Serbian Government has informed Greece that it intends to comply with the requests of the Quadruple Entente concerning the concessions demanded by Bulgaria, says an Athens despatch to the Matin.

The French Tricolor

(London "Chronicle.") The origin of the French tricolor is usually explained as it is by Carlyle. "Woman, too, are sewing cockades—not now of green, which being D'Artois color, the Hotel de Ville has had to interfere in it, but of red and blue, our old Paris colors; these, once based on a ground of constitutional white, are the famed tricolor—which (if prophecy err not) will go round the world." Another explanation, however, is that the tricolor combines the blue hood of St. Martin, which was borne on the standard of the ancient kings, the oriflamme (originally the banner of the Abbey of St. Denis), and the white flag of the Bourbons. Others make it the shield of the Orleans family.

French Steamer Sunk

Paris, Sept. 8.—The French steamship Guatemala has been torpedoed and sunk 50 miles off Belle Isle. The crew escaped in boats. She was 5,913 tons burthen.

Official Report

London, Sept. 8.—Three Zeppelins visited the Eastern Counties last night, and dropped bombs, seriously damaging fifteen small dwellings and starting several fires. Ten people were killed, and forty-six are reported wounded or missing.

The French Government report continued bombardment along the Western front. The British fleet bombarded the coast as far as Ostend, and enemy aviation ships, at Ostend, were attacked by air craft. The Russian report indicates a check of enemy attacks at some points. There is no material change elsewhere.

The Italian Government report small local successes.—BONAR LAW.

Gains in Gallipoli

London, Sept. 1.—Further gains for the Allied forces on Gallipoli Peninsula are chronicled in an official report received from General Sir Ian Hamilton, Commander-in-Chief of the British forces operating against the Turks. The report says:—"Further fighting on the 27th and 28th in the northern section of the line, resulted in the capture of an important tactical point commanding the Bay of Anafarta valley east, and appreciable gain of ground occupied by the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps. Fighting was almost entirely hand to hand, and of a severe character. Very heavy losses were inflicted on the Turks, and three of their machine guns, three trench mortars, three hundred rifles, five hundred bombs and a large quantity of small arms and ammunition was captured by us."

Offering \$3.80 Qtl.

The Mail and Advocate learns that the Labrador fish exporters are offering \$3.80 for Labrador soft fish. Four dollars is being offered at Battle Hr. Those who bought at \$3.60 last year scooped in from \$1.00 to \$1.50 per qtl. profit. The fish exporters, so the Advocate says, will have to pay \$4.70 or the fish won't be shipped, for the F. P. U. has offered to send vessels to the Labrador to buy fish at \$4.70.

Jobs are buying all the soft fish

procurable in Conception Bay and paying \$4.80. The price for soft Labrador fish in St. John's now is \$5 per qtl. The Advocate advises fishermen on the Labrador not to sell at less than \$4.50 and a bonus of 20 cents. Fishermen in the outports should be paid \$6.00 for tallow and \$4.80 for soft fish.

The S. S. Erick leaves St. John's at 2 p.m. on Saturday, Sept. 11th, for Labrador with freight and passengers. She sails at Hr. Grace and other northern ports.



Public Notice

Passports

Residents of this Colony, intending to travel out of Newfoundland, are hereby notified that they may be required to produce Passports at various points on their journey.

Passports are issued at the Department of the Colonial Secretary, in accordance with Rules and Regulations approved by the Governor in Council, to persons domiciled in Newfoundland, who are—

1. Natural-born British subjects;
2. The wives and widows of such persons, or
3. Persons naturalized in the United Kingdom, in the British Colonies, or in India.

A Passport cannot be issued on behalf of a person already abroad; such person should apply for one to the nearest British Mission or Consulate. Passports must not be sent out of Newfoundland by post.

Applicants are requested to have their Forms of Application (which can be obtained at this Department), properly filled in, according to marginal instructions thereon, and forwarded to the Department in sufficient time to permit of any necessary alterations being made in the same before the date upon which the Passport would be required.

The charge for a Passport is \$2.50, which covers a period of two years, after which it may be renewed for four further periods of two years each, at a charge of \$1.00 for each renewal.

Copies of Rules and Regulations, Forms of Application, or any desired information may be obtained upon request.
