MUTINY ON TRANSPORT WAS SHORT LIVED

Sailors Repented After Killing Second Lieutenant and Boatswain and Capturing Captain and Other Officers.

Official Version of Trouble at Odessa—Revolutionary Committee Assured Crew of the Kniaz Potemkin That Garrison Had Laid Down Its Arms.

Odessa, July 3.—8:36 p. m.—The fact that the Kniaz Potemkin remains on the high seas in charge of the mutineers is causing so much apprehension and uneasiness to the population of Odessa that the government has resolved to take the matter in hand, even though the measures adopted involve the loss of the battleship and the one torpedo boat destroyer here.

THE AUTHORITIES SAID TO BE POWERLESS.

St. Petersburg, July 3.—Joseph Mandelkern, a real estate dealer of New York, who has just arrived in St. Petersburg from Poland, where he visited Warsaw, Lodz, Byelostok and other centres, declares that a state of anarchy exists there which the military and police are admittedly powerless to handle.

He says all the members of the organization are armed with revolvers and knives, and are defying the police to interfere with them, under threats of death. On Thursday he saw a procession of 20,000 persons at Warsaw, carrying red flags, with not a policeman in sight. The police had been warned that if they appeared they would be murdered.
