### LOCAL NEWS

St. John Exhibition, September 12th to 15th.

Fall overcoats are now open for inspection at Pilgson's North End store.

A horse owned by Walter C. Short broke out of its stable and was captured on Elm street by the police last night.

There will be a meeting of the Intermediate Foot Ball League on Wednesday evening at 8:30 o'clock in the Curio Business University on Church St.

A special meeting of No. 1 Salvage Corps will be held tomorrow evening to take up the matter of sending members to the Chatham or St. Stephen regatta tournaments.

The 3rd Regt. C. A. having obtained permission for the sole use of the range on Saturday next, the 2nd Regt. Rifle Club match scheduled for that day will not be shot.

The fire department was called out this morning about 11:15 o'clock, but their services were not needed as the blaze was in a yard near the corner of Pitt and Duke streets, where a pot of tar had become ignited. The only damage done was the waste of a pot full of tar.

Mr. J. Edgar Edgett, of the wholesale buying staff of M. R. A. Limited, Star Line "Republic" at Boston for Great Britain, who is in the city for some weeks in visiting the manufacturing centres for his firm, Mr. Edgett will be accompanied by his wife and together they will visit the Continent, including Berlin and Paris, before returning.

About three weeks ago Rev. Joseph M. Jerg, S. J., arrived in the city on a visit from Boston. He contracted a severe cold and yesterday fears were entertained for his recovery. The reverend gentleman is being cared for at St. Vincent's convent, Cliff street, and enquires there this morning showed that there is an improvement. Rev. Thomas J. Gleason, S. I., president of the Boston College, is expected in the city today to visit the sick priest. Father Jerg was recently appointed rector of the Church of the Immaculate Conception in Boston.

### HAZEN J. DICK'S SON INSTANTLY KILLED

Shot by Companion's Rifle While Gunning at Mascarene

Hammer Caught in Clothing Discharging the Gun—Bullet Entered the Left Side Near the Heart.

ST. GEORGE, N. B., Aug. 25.—White gunning at Mascarene today Frank Dick, 19 years of age, was instantly killed by a shot from a rifle in the hands of his companion, Bert Cameron. The boys were hunting and sat down to rest. Cameron while handling the gun caught the hammer in his clothing, causing it to discharge. Young Dick was standing in front of him and the bullet entered his left side below the heart, killing him almost instantly.

Dr. Alexander was called and saw at once that the shot was fatal. On making an examination and equires he concluded that the boy's death was purely accidental and an inquest was unnecessary. The young man was the son of Hazen Dick, the well known druggist of St. John. Cameron is prostrated with grief over the unfortunate accident.

Much sympathy is felt for the parents of young Dick.

### POLICE COURT

Three drunks were dealt with in the usual manner in the police court this morning.

Geo. Winchester, a sailor, was found wandering about the Strait Shore road this morning and a fine of \$8 was allowed to stand against him, providing he gets on board his vessel.

Mary Jameson, the young girl who was a few days ago arrested for being out late, was again remanded to jail.

### HOLLAND AND VENEZUELA

THE HAGUE, Aug. 26.—M. De Reus, the minister of the Netherlands to Venezuela, who was expelled from that republic last month by President Castro, and who arrived here from the West Indies yesterday, had a long conference this morning regarding Venezuelan affairs, with M. Van Swinderen, the minister of foreign affairs.

In a subsequent interview with the representative of the Associated Press, M. De Reus characterized as a pure invention the assertion that Holland had lent her countenance to revolutionary schemes in Venezuela. M. De Reus has nothing to say regarding the purposes of the Netherlands, but declared that his expulsion from Venezuela must not be considered an infraction of international law, pointing out several precedents for the handing of their passports to ministers who had offended the chief of the state to which they were accredited.

The relations between Holland and Venezuela, M. De Reus said, already were strained before the indiscreet publication of a confidential letter he wrote to the House Entrow Society in Amsterdam.

### FIRST ACTIVE STEPS TOWARDS UNION

Baptists and Disciples Agree on Plan

Will Start by Uniting Weak Congregations Under One Pastor and Cultivating Closer Acquaintance.

A meeting which marks an important step in the negotiations for union between the Baptist and Christian churches was held last night.

At the recent convention of the "Disciples" committee present were: Rev. C. Ford, Vice President, F. C. H. Appel, Secretary, Thos. H. Bates, George Titus and H. E. Cook.

At nine o'clock they met with the committee of twelve members from the Baptist Church for the first joint meeting of the new committee. Organization of the joint committee was effected, Rev. J. F. Floyd, of St. John, being elected chairman, Rev. F. H. Best, of Upper Canada, N. S., secretary.

After a discussion of the present situation the gathering decided on several recommendations. They suggest that closer intimacy be cultivated between the two churches by the more frequent exchange of pulpits and other congregational courtesies.

In sections of the provinces where either or both of the churches are weak they suggest that one pastor be secured for both denominations, and that the church be run as one body.

This arrangement is to be carried out without any concessions at present on either side in the matter of doctrine.

It is expected that these preliminary steps will eventually lead to the union of the churches as the people get better acquainted with each other and each other's views on Christian matters. By starting with plans that are entirely acceptable it is thought that the ultimate progress will be more rapid than if they attempt to force matters.

### HORSE WAS TOO ANXIOUS TO COMMENCE WORK

New Fire Department Animal Tried to Hitch on Without Having Had any Training.

A horse that promises to become a lively animal for the fire department was purchased a few days ago and is enjoying life in a box stall at No. 3 station. He heard his first alarm this morning and made matters rather lively for a time. When the alarm sounded the trained horses ran quickly to their harness. The new horse, apparently thought that as he had been purchased for the same purpose, he must commence immediately. He kicked and plunged until he broke open the stall door and with a rush made for the front of the building. When he struck the main floor he became bewildered and in trying to check his speed, slipped and fell against the engine. He quickly got on his feet and was placed back in his stall.

### PLAYING WITH CARTRIDGES, YOUNG LAD WAS KILLED

WINNIPEG, Aug. 25.—Harold McKay, 18 years old, youngest son of G. D. McKay, president of the dry goods firm of McKay, Williams and Company, was killed almost instantly last evening.

He had been in the habit of exploding small calibre cartridges with a hammer from the window of his bedroom at home, allowing the bullets to strike against an opposite wall, where they did no damage. The boy had been warned of the danger, but continued the practice with fatal results. The bullet had grazed or entered the heart, traversing the breast from left to right.

Mr. McKay, father of the boy, is well known in Montreal, having been with the John Murphy Company, dry goods, for about a quarter of a century.
