SOCIETY EVENT RATHER THAN CORONER'S INQUEST

Dr. Spangler's Friends
Well Pleased With
Evidence Given

Dr. Warwick Reads His
Notes on Post-Mortem
Made

Miss Bowman Tells of
Treatment Given by
Dr. Spangler

The inquest into the death of Mrs. Annie McLaughlin, adjourned from Monday evening, was held last night in the court room of the police station. There was another large audience present and the court room almost resembled a social function rather than an inquest. The additional room afforded was much appreciated by those present.

Dr. Spangler's friends were well satisfied with the evidence given, and the opinion was freely expressed that it was strongly in his favor. The witnesses were Dr. T. D. Walker, Dr. Wm. Warwick and Mrs. A. S. Bowman. Dr. Walker told of the treatment given to Mrs. McLaughlin on the night of her death. He described the symptoms and his diagnosis and after hearing the autopsy said it proved the correctness of his diagnosis. He described the treatment he would give for the disease, which would include absolute rest for the patient. He did not know much about osteopathy, which, he said, was not generally recognized by the medical profession.

Dr. Warwick read his notes on the post-mortem examination which he made. It showed that death was due to pulmonary thrombosis. His examination showed the presence of a large number of clots, which had been the cause of death. He discussed the effects of manipulation and said if applied to the spine it would have no serious effect. The condition he discovered might have occurred even if the patient had remained absolutely quiet in bed without any movement whatever.

Mrs. Bowman was present on the night of Mrs. McLaughlin's death and told of the treatment given then. She had rubbed the patient on the abdomen and on the legs. Dr. Spangler had rubbed her spine and thighs, but not her legs below the knee. She had told Mrs. McLaughlin that in case of milk leg, which Dr. Spangler had said was her disease, the treatment was different, as the leg had always been tender. While a professional nurse she had had experience with similar cases. The inquest will be continued and probably completed tomorrow night.

EXPERIMENTS WITH GIRL

WHO "NEVER GREW UP"

Wonderful Medical Test is Reported to

Have Been Made by a London

Physician.

A wonderful medical experiment is

reported to have been successfully

carried out by a London physician in

treating a Devonshire girl, aged twen-

ty-three, who "never grew up," says

the London Daily Mirror.

Up to October last the girl had re-

quired constant nursing and protec-

tion, but she is now in fair way to

becoming an ordinary human being.

The physician who treated the case

described his method to a medical

correspondent of the Daily Mail.

"The young woman, whom treatment

began," said the physician, "was to

all intents and purposes a dull and

backward child of five. Thirty-three

inches in height, with lanky, dry hair,

bulging forehead, flat nose and

weak complexion, she sat all day, even

in summer, shivering before an open

fire.

"The anterior fontanelle, or 'soft

spot' on the head, which in the baby

becomes closed in the first few months

of life, could still be seen in the

lower part of the neck, being

taken each night.

"Her condition now, after two

months' treatment, is as follows: In

height she has increased more than

two and a half inches. The skin,

which was harsh and dry, is now

moist, warm and natural.

"The hair, which was scanty and

dry, is growing fast, and has a more

natural appearance.

"The most wonderful change, how-

ever, is in her mental condition. She

has acquired a most extraordinary lo-

quacity. It seems as if she had been

listening and storing up words from

babbling. She could not have learned

her present vast vocabulary in the

last few weeks. She evidently knew

the words before, but was unable to

reproduce them until the thyroid ex-

tract stimulated her activity and de-

veloped the hitherto latent powers

of speech.

"The ordinary individual takes ex-

tract of thyroid he rapidly loses

weight, since the slightest excess of

breathing down the fatty tissues of

the body. Here, however, the twelve

and a half grains taken daily did not

make an excess, but merely supplied

the amount which nature had been

craving for years."
