INCREASED REPRESENTATION FOR THE MARITIME PROVINCES

Representatives of Governments of N. B., N. S. and P. E. I. Working to Protect Themselves from Loss of Federal Seats Through Redistribution Which Will Follow Next Census—Meeting Here Yesterday.

At the conference of the representatives of the Maritime Provinces yesterday, it was decided to ask the federal government to secure an amendment to the British North America Act fixing the representation of each of the Maritime Provinces so that it will not fall below what it was when the province entered the confederation. That is to say, the governments of the provinces whose representation, it is feared, will be reduced by five members as a result of the redistribution of seats following the taking of the next census have agreed to initiate a movement to secure to the three provinces the right to elect five more members than they have at the present time.

ST. STEPHEN'S CADETS MAY FORM BOY SCOUTS

Officers of Scots Boys' Brigade Corps Have the Formation of Six Patrols Under Consideration.

The St. Stephen's Scots Cadet Corps will meet in uniform tonight at 7.30. This will begin the winter's drill and the corps' 19th year as an active organization. They have over 90 boys enrolled as members and 70 of those in full Highland uniform. It is under consideration by the officers of the corps to form a troop of the Boy Scouts, consisting of six patrols or more and trying the newer organization as an extra inducement for the boys. Only those boys having the best averages being allowed to become scouts.

ANGRY DOG CAUSES DELAY TO BARK

Captain Hanson of Bark Zuba Bitten While Ship is Under Way and Vessel Returns to Port.

The Norwegian bark Zuba, which has been lying at anchor off Partridge Island for some time, sailed last Wednesday morning for Buenos Ayres, South America, with a cargo of dry lumber. The vessel had got well down the bay, when a large dog owned by Captain Hansen attacked him, biting his hand very badly, the animal's teeth lacerating the captain's fingers. The captain's hand was swelling badly and, fearing blood poisoning, the bark was put about, and returned to the anchorage of the Island. The captain at once came up to the city for treatment.
