Bathing, Boating and Fishing Prohibited
Board of Health Keeps Ban on Lakes Lomond, Latimer and Robinson.

At a special meeting yesterday, the Board of Health reaffirmed its decision to prohibit bathing, boating and fishing in Loch Lomond, Lake Latimer, Lake Robinson, and all other bodies of water from which the city obtains its supply of food water, until such time as the city's medical advisers are able to report an absence of pollution in the water sources drained by the city mains.

The delegation which appeared before the board a week ago, protesting the ban imposed by the health authorities, returned, as requested, yesterday to hear of the board's final decision after careful consideration of the present situation.

SHOCKED BY LIGHTNING.
Newcastle, July 15.—The first rain which has fallen in this district for the past six weeks came last evening in the most severe electrical storm in years. Ban Must Continue
Struan Robertson was the spokesman of the considerable party who presented themselves to the board's decision. Chairman John Kelly informed them that subsequent tests still showed pollution, and that the ban must therefore be continued.

Lomond Analyzed Pure
Mr. Robertson said that if the board's decision was a final one, he would be obliged to sell his summer cottage, as deprived of bathing, fishing and bathing privileges, it would have no further attraction for him. He presented the board a certificate of analysis of the water taken from in front of his cottage that was made by Provincial Analyst Paddock. The analysis showed the water to be pure.

German Law Milder
H. R. McLellan asked if the samples of water analyzed for the board had been taken from the main body of water above the highway bridge at Loch Lomond? and if they had not, could the board take such drastic action against the pleasure resorts situated on the main body of water? The Health Act was, he said, most drastic, and German law was mild in comparison.

Discrimination Shown
G. Stinbald complained that Terrie, Otter and other minor lakes were still being fished and boated upon. He considered this a case of discrimination which he found hard to bear in view of the "merry ha ha" passed on by the unrestricted anglers who whipped the small lakes.

Mr. McLellan asked Dr. Abramson, the board's bacteriologist, if he thought it was fair of the board to place the ban on Loch Lomond without a test of waters from the main body?

Board Entirely Justified
Dr. Abramson replied that he thought the board was entirely justified, for he had seen with his own eyes eighteen cottages and several lumber camps located on the shores of the Loch Lomond, there was evidence of teams having been driven in and out of the water, sewage tanks or privies drained into the lake, and bathing was openly indulged in in its waters.

Similar Precautions Elsewhere
He felt that all would agree that it was of paramount importance that the city's water supply should be kept pure. He knew of many cities possessing bodies of water fully as attractive as Loch Lomond, and most desirable as summer resorts, but from which the public were jealously barred, in order that the purity of the water supply might be assured. In addition to these precautions, others were taken, the water was sand-filtered and chlorinated as well. In St. John this was not done, the water was used raw as it came from its source. He thought drinking water should be treated very carefully by citizens in view of the recent alarming discoveries. He was not adverse to granting restricted boating and fishing privileges to law-abiding citizens who wished to use the lake in this manner, once the purity of the supply had been re-established. If it did so were not to establish the dangerous precedent.

Blamed Lake Latimer
R. E. Fitzgerald, introduced himself as a summer resident of Lake Latimer district, and reviewed in an exhaustive manner the conditions existing there. The water in Lake Latimer, he said, was almost too low this summer to be free of risk. He claimed that the force with which the water was sluiced from Lake Robinson into Lake Latimer agitated the bottom of the lake to such a degree as to cause the sediment to be constantly stirred up. He advocated the use of screens at the end of the pipes instead of at the lakes, an idea which he had taken into the mains at Lake Robinson direct, and restoring Latimer to its former level. Mr. Fitzgerald did not consider there was any pollution existing in the waters of Loch Lomond. In view of the conditions he had outlined, he felt it was but natural to assume that the source of pollution was actually centred in Lake Latimer. The Water Works Department, he thought, should attend at once to the mains at that lake.

Possible Solution
W. H. Golding said he had accompanied the board on its tour of inspection and went over the system for the first time. As one of the younger citizens taking an interest in public welfare he thought the difficulties now arising in keeping the food waters pure might be almost entirely eliminated by the erection of a concrete covered sluice way at the highway outlet into the main body of water, with an emergency reserve of a chlorinating plant, should special circumstances demand the added safeguard.

Such safeguards would be sufficient, he considered, to allow modified pleasure-riding on the larger body, Loch Lomond, one of the city's most cherished resorts.

In concluding the session, Chairman Kelly assured the delegation of the board's careful consideration of their claims, and said he felt sure that they, as good citizens, would abide by its prohibitions until such time as conditions improve sufficiently to warrant their removal.

After the delegation withdrew, the board passed a formal resolution, emphasizing the steps they had taken to safeguard the purity of the city's water supply, and instructed the secretary to forward a copy thereof to the ministry of health at Fredericton for its approval.

Considerable routine business was then transacted, yesterday's meeting being a postponed meeting of the board's regular monthly session.

Fredericton High Staff Completed
Teachers Engaged at Salaries No Higher Than Paid During Last School Year.

Fredericton, N. B., July 15.—The teaching staff of the Fredericton High School, where the old staff resigned when the board of trustees refused to meet the New Brunswick Teachers' Association salary schedule, has been completed with the announcement today of the appointment of Jas. Burns, son of W. M. Burns, principal of the Model School of this city. He is a graduate of the U. N. B. and Queen's University.

Two of the new staff were engaged during the past school year and Miss Thompson, who has been principal of the Charlotte street school, is also appointed.

It was said today that the salaries of the staff of the High School will be no more than they were during the past year, which is in accordance with the policy originally adopted and adhered to by the board of trustees.
