LORD CURZON SPEAKS EMPHATICALLY

Expresses Determination to Bring Germany Into the Comity of Nations.

London, Nov. 24—One of the most outspoken warnings ever addressed by the Foreign Minister of one nation to another friendly nation was delivered publicly today at a funcheon by Marquis Curzon of Kedleston, to France. The British Foreign Minister declared that, if France pursued an isolated and individual policy, she would not in the long run injure Germany and would fall to protect her self.

"Peace will never be achieved," said Lord Curzon, "if any one power tries to steal a march on another and concludes an arrangement on its own account. The Foreign Minister bluntly reminded France that her safety lay, not in her own strength, but in the confidence of the world, and he cautioned France that she could not succeed by a revengeful policy toward Germany or be permitted by isolated action to frustrate the work of the nations at Washington.
