





The remainder of Admiral Sah's fleet has arrived at Wu Sung without ammunition and without provisions. Reports are numerous of the defection or the capture of various other Chinese cities, these including Yuha and Foo Chow.
The imperial telegraph operators have some on strike. They demand three months' pay in advance.
It is reported that Yuan Shi Kai is at Hankow negotiating with Gen. Li, leader of the rebels, who is in a position to dictate terms. It is believed that the south will demand the retirement of the Manchu toyalty with a pension, and will not be astisfied with less.
The revolutionary leaders at Shanghai oday expressed no fear that the Imperial-sts would attempt to recapture the city. They said that the new government was fully competent to control the situation and protect foreign interests.
