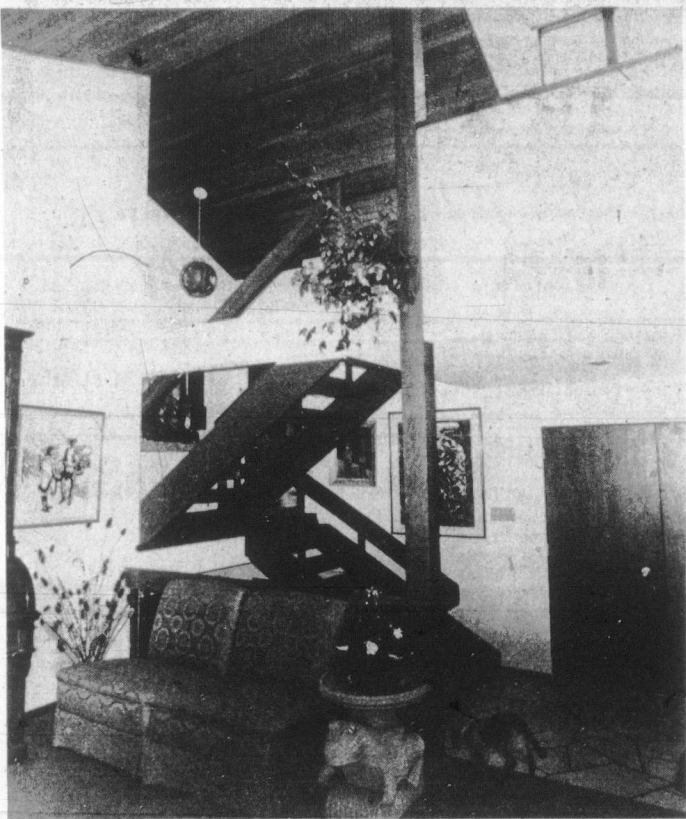

 Donna and Bill Sanderson, with their five children, Brad, 20, Janet, 19, Cortney, 14, Paula, 11 and Lianne, 10, have lived in their contemporary Meadowwood Road home for six years. The home was designed with enormous windows permitting maximum natural light throughout the home. The kitchen (right) is warm and cozy with pattern on pattern in both carpeted floor and wallpaper. It allows ample space for family meals.

The dining room (lower right) has a runner on the table crocheted by Donna. It picks up the warm rust of the broadloom and predominant gold of the dining room seat covers. The stunning wall design was made by the Sandersons by covering Styrofoam with heavy foil and attaching it to the wall with double-sided tape.

The home combines contemporary furnishings with antique pieces picked up at auctions, although a focal point of the living room is a burl walnut desk which is a family heirloom. The furniture in the quiet area where Donna is sitting (below) is done in brown and beige with the not-quite-sheers in off-white.

The Sandersons worked with an architect to get the free-flowing design they wanted. The location was not a problem — they had lived in the area for 20 years and knew exactly where they wanted to build their family home.
