We drove out to the County school houses and Township halls with a herse and buggy. I do not know anyone who won the affection of more people than Frank Lalor. I was very fond of him.

I remember when the Reciprocity Election was on in 1911, you came here and spoke in the old Opera House, and I went up to the station with Frank Lalor to meet you. Of course you gave a most logical address, and when you got through, you would think that nothing could be said in favour of reciprocity.

I was very glad to see you and renew acquaintance with you at the Centennial here a few years ago, when you came up with Charlie McCrea.

I hear of you and your wife and family through Bessie Trotter, and I am glad to know that your family are all getting along well.

You established an outstanding reputation as a Speaker and as the best Debater in the House of Commons when you were there. I have followed your career with great interest.

I hope that you will have many more years of a healthy and happy life.
