# A COUNTRY PLACE.

ADDING ATTRACTIVENESS TO A BARE AND SEVERE EXTERIOR

Simple Treatment Best-The Most Pleasing Color Scheme - An Old House Before and After Remodeling-Rough Stone Work.

More and more people are turning country. In the case of some it is a home for the summer vacation months only, while for thousands of other whose business is in cities or villages the rapidly spreading trolley lines have



afforded an opportunity for permanent mes in rural communities. The first thought of those who buy low priced homes in the country is to make their purchase more attractive. It is to give suggestions along this line that a writer in the Ladies' World submits

A simple treatment of country houses is always best, even where one's purse is not limited. Too many have the idea that beautifying a country place calls for all the bay windows, dormer win-dows and gables it is possible to stick upon the house. This is often followed by a painter with an assortment of paints, all "loud" in color-raw reds, glaring yellows, harsh greens, and I have even seen black used in an attempt to adorn a country house.
