#### SUBMARINE WAR ON UNARMED BOATS CONTINUES.

LONDON, April 6.—The British steamer Northlands, 2,000 tons, ore laden, was sunk by a German submarine in the English Channel off Beachy Head yesterday. The Northlands sank in ten minutes. Her crey of 24 men were picked up later by the Belgian steamer Topati. The steamer was owned by the Northlands S.S. Co., Limited of Cardiff.


