AGRICULTURAL EXHIBIT HERE
 Valuable Information in Grain-growing, Poultry Raising and Farm Engineering.
 The Agricultural Exhibition cars, which are touring the country by the co-operation of the Department of Agriculture, the O. A. C. and Grand Trunk, are in Belleville today on Pimlico street not far from the market. The one car contains exhibits of grains, fungus diseases, insect pests and rots, of poultry and methods of feeding and is in charge of Mr. D. James of Thorn Hill. The second car is devoted to exhibits of lightning rods, drainage, concrete work and all manner of farm engineering. The entire exhibition is in charge of Mr. J. W. Clark, of Calverville.

This evening at the city hall, Agriculture moving pictures including those showing the life history of the bacon hog; and the conformation of the dairy cow will be shown. Mrs. Watts of Toronto will speak on "Food Conservation." The meeting is free to the public.
