TRAGEDY IN CHICAGO Federal and state authorities in Chicago, on Monday took up the task of fixing the responsibility for the over-turning of the steamer *Gezonia* at her dock in the Chicago river on Saturday, in which approximately 1,200 of 2,408 excursionists aboard were drowned. Examination of the members of the crew was started. Evidence also was sought to show whether the vessel was properly constructed.

Coroner Hoffman will not hold an inquest until the work of searching for the dead is completed, an additional twenty-five divers were sent into the hull to recover bodies believed to there. There is a possibility that twenty more bodies are beneath the wreckage of the ship.
