AUSTRIA OF C

For Two Years Franz Joseph funct, and of Never Have German Plot

By Courier Leased Wire. London, Nov. 22. (New Times cable) - News of the Austrian Emperor's last Schenbrunn Castle was received London too late to catch the editions of the papers, so no opinion is available as to the effect, if any, it will have on the course of the war or Austrian people. "The Daily Mail" in a late edition publishes a short obituary which says: "Emperor Francis Joseph was politically defunct for many years. In the present war he was a very insignificant part and being in vigorous health he had ever consented to be a passive agent of a German Emperor. The initial disasters which Austria weighed heavily upon the loss of Galicia in the year 1914 he felt as a crushing blow. From then onwards Germany had virtual control of the destinies of the empire, and of the one proud Hapsburg, which began with the abdication of his weak predecessor and his own virtual abdication in Emperor William. "From first to last his reign has been marked by domestic troubles which have not been witnessed in any other reign. It has closed amidst the full ruin of the greatest war in the history of the world. He loved themselves to become puppets."

Austria Impressed London, Nov. 22. - Telegrams from Amsterdam, the Cent correspondent says: "Vienna reports that the death of the Emperor had been expected for some time. In special editions of the papers, made a special cabinet public. A special cabinet was held. The heir to the throne, Archduke Charles Francis, for some time in Vienna. A meeting of the cabinet has been called at Vienna. Due to Cold Paris, Nov. 22. - The Emperor Francis Joseph was caused by a cold which monarch caught while in Schenbrunn Park, ten with the King of Bavaria, to a Zurich despatch to the cold developed into pneumonia. When he died yesterday that the condition was serious, his nephew, Archduke Charles Francis, his apparent, and Frederick, were summoned bedside. Died in Harness London, Nov. 22. - Francis Joseph of Austria died in harness, according to an official despatch from Vienna. The despatch says Emperor rose at his usual time on Tuesday and engaged in his business. He received his usual eight o'clock and two o'clock audience for Foreigners. In the afternoon he grew worse and the physicians' real death was approaching."
