Mrs. Eliza Julia Keddie, who
died at New Ross on the 7th inst.,
aged 92 years was the daughter of
the late Francis Gillman, quar-
termaster general of the Nova Scotia
Pencible Infantry, commanded by
the Duke of Kent in the city of
Halifax and at Quebec. Mrs. Ked-
die was with her parents on board
the transport Archduke Charles, at
the time it met disaster on Jeddore
rocks, May 29th, 1816. Captain
Glennie swam ashore with her
strapped to his back with his sash.
Her father was an English soldier
of noble birth, and was the Duke
of Kent's most trusted officer and
friend. He served in the revolution-
ary war; was in the battle of
Bunker Hill, and other engage-
ments. A son of the deceased lady
married the eldest daughter of Mr.
and Mrs. William Legge, of Bridge-
