# Election.

ONTARIO MACHINE WORKED IN QUEBEC AND THE MARITIME PROVINCES-EXPOSURES TO COME\_THE RACE CRY.

Winnipeg, Nov. 15 .- Sir Charles Tupper accorded an interview to a reporter here en route west. He confirmed the report that he had decided to finally retire from public life, but said that he must first fuffil his promise of giving assistance to his friends in Yale, B. C., in the approaching election on Nov. 27. After that his future

movements would be decided upon. He desired to thank his friends in Winnipeg for the vary enthusiastic reception extended to him on his arrival. He regretted that he could not remain longer in Winnipeg, but hoped that on his return he would have more time at his disposal.

"Have you any remarks to make on the general result of the election, Sir Charles,?" asked the reporter.

"So far as the country at large is concerned," was the reply, "I feel that the result has been unfortunate, but so far as concerns the conservative party it is all that could be desired, and is quite satisfactory. The government succeeded in obtaining a majority in its favor by resorting to the same despicable methods as were employed in 1896. The race cry was once more employed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier in Quebec, with good effect. In 1896 they claimed that I objected to Sir Wilfrid Laurier on the ground that he was a French Roman Cathothat he was a French Roman Catholic, a statement which they knew to be foundationless.

EQUALLY MALICIOUS. "An fqually false and malicious statement was made in this election by the Liberals, who repeated and reiterated the false assertion that I said 'Sir Wilfrid Laurier is too English for me.' What I did say was that Sir Waffrid Laurier's policy in regard to his imperial federation scheme was too English for me, but I never would consent to a dollar of Canadian taxes poor conclusions, because we have made them a texture of wine and dreams instead of the conclusions and the conclusions are the conclusions. we took the ground that not a single dollar should be expended for corrupt purposes, 22 seats were wrested from the government and a body of Conthe government and a body of Conservative members elected that will compare well with any that ever occupied seats in the house. The great cities of Toronto and Hamilton gave overwhelming majorities in condemnation of the government, wrested their constituencies from the hands of the Liberals and placed men in parliament of the highest standing and character to be found in Canada. Ontario has the magnificent record of giving a majority of 22 against the government, which at dissolution held a majority of 12.

"Manitoba has stood true to the position taken by her one year ago, when, in spite of all that Mr. Sifton could do, the Greenway government was defeated, and Hon. Hugh John Macdonald was placed in power with a good working majority, after having had only six members in the previous parkament.

The boast that Hugh John would be defeated even if it took \$100,000 to do so has been fulfilled, but Mr. Sifton will return to Parliament with a compact support. Parliament with a compact support, which, so far as returns are at present in, it appears that his own hat will cover. A minister without a fol-

lower in his province is certainly a unique spectacle in parliament."
In conclusion, Sir Charles said, " have good reasons to believe that the Hon. Mr. Tarte and Sir Wilfrid Laurier themselves to-day regard the startling successes of the attempts to bind Quebec together on a race cry with no little alarm."

Sir Charles expressed the belief that on a recount the Opposition would be able to secure Halifax and Hants, thus almost evening up the numbers in Nova Scotia.
