GALLANT SOLDIER WILL NOT PER-MANENTLY REMAIN IN AFRICA-

He Is Too Foud of Canada and Has Only One Reason for Accepting a Position in the Baden-Powell Constabulary-Only Colonial Honored With a Command in That Semi-Civil Corps.

There has been a general impression that Col. Steele intended re-maining permanently in South Afriea, but such is not the case. intention is to remain there for a year, or perhaps 18 months, and

"No one is remaining on that con-tinent," said he, "because of any preference for country or climate. It can't compare with Canada for

Asked why, if such were his feel-

ing, he was going back even for year, the colonel said he wished to put in twelve months or so, as his business affairs would not be settled until that period had elapsed. He wishes to retire, when he does so, with comfort and convenience, and does not like the idea of putting in a year of idleness and waiting. Besides, he explained that there were many young officers in the Canadian contingent of constabulary who were comparatively inexperienced, and had not been in South Africa with other contingents. These would be all the better of having an officer over them who had been through the early scenes of fighting, and understood, on the other hand, the men with whom he was dealing.

Col. Steele was the only colonial honored in this way by the Imperial Government, though there were in all 5.000 applications for such commis-He felt consequently, that he would not be doing right to with-draw, especially as he had not sought command, but it had come to

Mrs. Steele will not accompany him to South Africa.

#### Pretence at Funerals

The Bruce Herald complains that many Walkerton people drive half to the cemetery with a funeral and then turn back, and the editor remarks that when his funeral hapens he hopes people will either go the whole way or keep out of the procession. The point is well taken, It is a poor mark of respect to pay a departed citizen to start out with a funeral and back out after driving half a mile. There is a lot of humbug in towns and villages in connection with funerals-visitors who come to offer sympathy and count the handles on the coffin, to cheer the widow and see if she cries real hard or only half-hard, and men who hitch up and drive soltmnly with the sad procession through the streets where their attendance may be publicly noted, and then make a circuit home by the back streets when the outskirts of the town are reached. It is a heartless business, and it would be better if people quit shamming went right ahead with their esa until their own turn comes There is perhaps not a place in Onario that does not need to be lifted back to honest ground in its relation

### Grewing Table Beets.

Upon a sandy loam land which had been for ten years heavily manured and cropped with table beets and celery it was found by the New Jersey station that the use of nitrate of amounts varying from 400 rolls job at 16 to 17c.; large rolls 14 to 151-2c; good to choice tubs, 14 to 16c; inferior, 10 to 12c; creamery, boxto 700 pounds per acre, in three equal applications, hastened the maturing of the crop. At the first pullmaking of two pound ing and bunches there was 63 per cent, more on nitrated plots than on those without the nitrate. At a second pulling, four days later, the nitrated plots gave 135 per cent, more bunches, and at a third pulling; three days later, there was 174 per cent. after which they produced about equal amounts. The greatest gain per acre by use of nitrate was where they used 700 pounds per acre, \$27.10 more than where trate was not used. This was due to the higher price obtained for the earlier pullings and amounted to about \$3 for every dollar the nitrate cost.


