A NOVEL SCHEME.

London, Nov. 26.—The proposal to have the new great thoroughfare from Holburn to the Strand constructed with two rows of stores, one above the other, with a raised iron work footway, half covered, in addition to the ordinary road level sidewalk, is attracting widespread public support. There would be light iron bridges thrown across at the intersecting streets on the upper level, as well as over the main thoroughfare at convenient distances. Sir Frederick Bramwell secured credit for this scheme, but it is now shown that Charles Dickens suggested precisely a similar one in 1864.

THOSE PAVING EXTRAS

Amount to Less Than
\$400.

VERY SATISFACTORY SETTLEMENT—THOSE UNFINISHED GRANOLITHIC WALKS—DEPUTIES APPOINTED—GENERAL COUNCIL BUSINESS.

The city council sat out the time limit last evening. The aldermen met promptly on time, and utilized the entire evening in accomplishing their work, much of which was of an important character. There was a fair attendance of the representatives, the absentees being Ald. Sane, Stephens and Taylor.

C. R. Hancock asked to be allowed \$7.50 for extra work in grass cutting.

When the account of Lieut.-Col. Rankin for the expense of the Gorrie demonstration, \$61.42, was presented, Ald. McGee suggested that in future the city give an informal reception to contingent boys and on the arrival of them all a formal reception.

Applications from several citizens to cut and trim trees were referred to the chief of police.

Jno. H. Symington wrote complaining of imperfect drainage on Mercer street.—Board of Works.

The Health Department wrote cancelling the lease on Tecumseh Park. In this connection the Mayor said he had received a communication from the Department saying that the commanding officer would be here shortly to complete arrangements.

THE CITY'S OPPORTUNITY.

Ward Stanworth wrote as follows: "Messrs. Buller, Hunter & Co., of Kelowna, manufacturers of windmills and articles connected therewith, are considering the advisability of forming a joint stock company and moving their works to some centre where they can get greater railway facilities and the advantages attendant thereon.

"If a joint stock company is formed they will employ from 40 to 50 persons, many of the experts, and the establishment will be an acquisition to whatever city in which they carry on their business.

"I would be pleased to have the council make the privileges they can offer to the advantage of the company to induce them to settle in the City of Chatham."

The letter was referred to finance. Lewis & Richards expressed their sympathy to the board of works. Mr. Charles Munn, complaining of the L. E. & D. R. R. blocking the road near his premises.—Property.

BOARD OF WORKS.

Ald. McKee reported as follows:

1. That owing to the lateness of the season we notified Messrs. Marden & Co. not to continue the construction of the granolithic walk this year and we recommended that a settlement be made with Marden & Co. on the following terms:—That the 20 per cent. retained by the city on all completed work be paid, but that nothing be paid on the uncompleted walks on Lorne Ave. or on King St. east—so

far as the 20 per cent. retained is concerned on the King St. walk—or on any of the other walks under construction, provided they enter into an agreement to complete all the walks undertaken this year by July 1, 1901, according to the plans and specifications and terms of their present contract.

2. Your special committee, composed of the finance and board of works committees, to whom was referred the settlement of Messrs. Lynch & Lynch's contract for the construction of the vitrified brick pavement, beg to report that after a conference with the contractors in the city solicitor's office, which lasted all this afternoon, we recommend the following settlement:

A—That the first item in their account of \$10 for the difference in cost of cement used for crossings to expedite traffic, be allowed.

B—That the item of \$153, being the difference in cost of cement between Canadian Portland and Dykerhoff cement, be allowed.

C—That \$176.70 be allowed for filling in space between curb and sidewalk and for filling around tops of in-takes and around telegraph, telephone and electric light poles, the item in the account for same being \$250.

D—That \$50 be allowed for extra sand used in cushion over and above the two inches required, instead of \$250, as charged, the above four items amounting to \$389.70.

E—That \$20 be deducted from said sum for damage to sidewalk in front of Chatham Loan and Savings Co., making \$369.70 due Lynch & Lynch.

F—That we purchase 198 barrels of Thorold cement at 85 cents per barrel, amounting to \$168.30, and pay the sum of \$15 for crushed stone bought of Lynch & Lynch.

G—That the items of \$199.25 and \$75, being the cost of crushing brick, etc., which is to be paid by the Massion Brick Co., be left in abeyance, and that we accept the sum of \$1,500 from Lynch & Lynch in lieu of a bond as a guarantee for the proper maintenance and repair of the King St. pavement for five years—said \$1,500 to bear interest at 4 per cent., which sum is to be deposited with the city treasurer to be forfeited to the city in case, after notification, the contractors fail to maintain and keep in repair said pavement during the term of five years, and that the balance of the contract price, viz., \$10,778.25, as well as the aforesaid items of account (after deducting the payments already made) be paid Messrs. Lynch & Lynch as well as the \$500 deposited with their original tender for the work, 20 per cent. of the price being of course retained for 30 days after the completion of the work as required by law, provided they enter into an agreement and deposit \$1,500 as hereinbefore stated.

VERY SATISFACTORY.

Ald. McKee said in presenting the report that its contents proved very satisfactory to the board of works. He knew of very few private or corporation contracts, amounting to over \$11,000 as that of paving King street had, where the total bill for extra amounted to as little as \$369.70, and he hoped the Board and others who had been excited regarding this matter, would look into and make note of the facts. Ald. McKee also advised the deposit of \$1,500 as a very safe guarantee of the soundness of the work from Lynch & Lynch.

Ald. Sulman asked if the engineer had accepted the work.

The Mayor said the engineer had reported it done completely as per contract, but reserved his final acceptance until the spring when the permanency of the slushing
