BLIND PUPILS MIS-PLACED.

Given Literary Studies When Me-
chanics Was Their Natural Bent.

Brantford, Dec. 1.—There were no
features yesterday at the investigation
at the Institute for the Blind.

At the morning session Assistant
Engineer McIntyre, against whom a
charge of political partisanship was
Thursday made, submitted his de-
fence. Several witnesses swore that
McIntyre had not engaged in political
work on election, and that he worked
at the institute the greater part of
the day.

Frederick Boyer at Port Colborne,
a former blind pupil, at his own re-
quest cross-examined the witness
Wickens in an endeavor to show that
sufficient attention was not shown to
the blind as to their adaptability for
different lines of work, and that pu-
pils of mechanical ability only were
engaged in literary pursuits. Atten-
tion was also called to the fact that
graduates who had been forced to
abandon their trade for the poorhouse,
subsequent to their departure from
the institute.

W. B. Preston was also examined
as to the drive the pupils had been
given to the Aylesworth meeting at
the drill hall. Denials were forthcom-
ing to many statements made by
Truss.

Thomas Truss, who laid charges,
among which was one that pupils vis-
ited an alleged house of ill-repute, is
now threatened with action for slan-
der by the woman in question, whose
house, according to the evidence of
pupils already heard, is not disor-
derly.

The investigation is adjourned until
Dec. 11.

BRITAIN'S OPPORTUNITY.

London Daily Mail Enthusiastic Over
Canadian For Ambassador.

London, Dec. 1.—The Daily Mail
this morning takes up the agitation
for the appointment of a Canadian as
ambassador at Washington in suc-
cession to Sir Mortimer Durand. In an
editorial the paper says:

"It would be a wise course, if the
Government is anxious to consolidate
the Empire. Canada has suffered in
the past through the ignorance or
shortcomings of British diplomats;
witness the Ashburton treaty of 1842
(as to the boundary line between
Maine and Canada); the Oregon agree-
ment of 1846 (a territorial dispute be-
tween Great Britain and the United
States) which by treaty and the
Alaska boundary arbitration. Never
was there such an opportunity for
repairing these mistakes.

"It cannot be alleged that a Cana-
dian as ambassador would be likely
to take up an extravagant or danger-
ous position in his treatment of ques-
tions between the United States and
Canada. The Canadian frontier is
2,000 miles long, and it could be de-
fended only with difficulty. Canada
is so much weaker than the United
States that she will never provoke a
quarrel.

"Her enormous and rapid expansion
justifies her claim to a larger share
in the conduct of the imperial policy,
and the time has arrived to take her
into partnership with the mother
country.

WRECK CHINESE LAUNDRY.

Gang of London Toughs Demolish a
Store and Assault Proprietor.

London, Dec. 1.—Thursday night
about 10.30 a murderous attack was
made upon John Lee, a Chinaman,
who keeps a laundry shop on Rich-
mond street, as a result of which he
is in a serious condition.

Several men are said to have entered
the store and commenced to wreck
it. Every window in the place was
broken and the counters torn up.
Before the Chinaman could secure aid
or call for the police the shop had
been literally torn to pieces.

When the owner attempted to pro-
tect his property he was knocked
down and kicked and beaten until he
was in a serious condition.

This is the second time within a few
weeks that Lee's shop has been at-
tacked by the same gang of rowdies.

SMALLPOX IN "PEN."

One Convict Has It and Others Say
They Feel Sick.

Ottawa, Dec. 1.—Warden Platt, of
the Kingston Penitentiary, was in the
city yesterday to acquaint the Justice
Department of a case of smallpox in
the big penal institution.

A convict who arrived six months
ago contracted the disease, and the
authorities found it necessary to re-
move him for isolation purposes to a
isolated building on the penitentiary
farm.

dozen convicts are complaining of ill-
ness, hinting that they are also feel-
ing smallpox like.

WILL BARE UNION SECRETS.

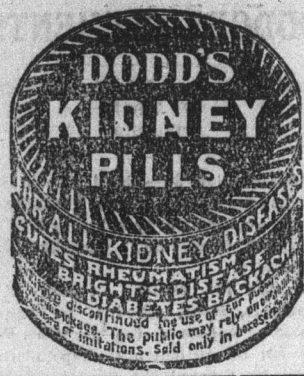
Sensations Likely to Arise From Trial
of Cornelius Shea.

Chicago, Dec. 1.—Secrets of the
International Brotherhood of Team-
sters of the United States are to be
made public as a result of the con-
fessions of guilt yesterday of Albert
Young and three other co-defendants
of Cornelius P. Shea, president of
the organization, who, together with
16 other members of the union, were
placed on trial for conspiracy.

The confessions caused a stampede
among the attorneys for the union,
and a delay was asked for on the
ground that the blow given the de-
fence was too serious to overcome in
a short time. The motion was over-
ruled.

Police Chief Indicted.

San Francisco, Dec. 1.—Abraham
Ruef, and Chief of Police Jeremiah
Dinan, were jointly indicted by the
grand jury yesterday on a charge of
conspiracy in connection with the al-
leged protection of a house of ill-
fame. Chief Dinan was also separat-
edly indicted on a charge of per-
jury in his testimony before the
grand jury.



The Newfoundland Fisheries.

St. John's, Nfld., Dec. 1.—Thus far
in the present fishing season about
35,000 barrels of salted herring have
been taken from Bay of Islands. Ten
vessels will sail for the fishing
grounds this week.

It is estimated that the total output
will equal that of last year, but Cana-
dian and Newfoundland vessels are
getting larger catches, while Ameri-
can vessels are getting smaller catches,
than last season.

GO TO REGULAR COURTS.

Political Criminals in Russia to Es-
cape Secret Tribunals.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 1.—The Min-
istry of Justice yesterday decided that
political crimes must in future be
submitted to regular civil tribunals
and in accordance with the ordinary
procedure, instead of under the arbi-
trary methods of the gendarmes and
secret police.

WHAT ARE YOU?

Just a Man in Business or a Real
Business Man—There's a Differ-
ence As Many Know.

It is the easiest thing in the world
to do business with a business man,
and one of the hardest things in the
world to try to do business with one
who is not a business man.

It is a safe estimate that not more
than 20 per cent. of the men in busi-
ness are good business men, says The
Toronto World. Taking this percent-
age as a criterion, there is little won-
der that nearly every big corporation
and private company maintains a spe-
cial department devoted to tracing and
correcting errors. These errors, for
the most part, have for their cause
and origin the misgivings and arro-
gance of the management.

A man with small capital, but pos-
sessing business capacity surpassing
the mediocre, receives an audience
with a bank manager.

"I have \$5,000 cash. I wish to en-
gage in a certain business. My obliga-
tions will be \$20,000; my prospects
are good; they are so and so. Can you
support me in the proposition?"

"Well, what additional security have
you to offer in the way of protection
to the bank in case of your default?
Your proposition?" asks the banker.

"I have none except confidence in
myself that I shall succeed, and the
success of the undertaking will in it-
self be security against loss to the
bank," replies the man.
The banker then quibbles, quotes all
the failures he has ever heard of, and
dismisses his client with the tired-out
expression that he "will consider it."
The client, of course, sees there is no
enterprise in that banker, so he strikes
another, perhaps receives encourage-
ment and proceeds with his plans.

It was through just such propositions
as this that the present general man-
ager of one of the big city banks de-
veloped the business of a branch
combined volume of business of four
other banks in the town. He was a
business man and understood business
men. He said yes or no to a propo-
sition without quibbling or in fear of
his judgment. He rose to the highest
office in his line because he was a
business man in all the meaning that
the words imply.

A stranger walks into an insurance
office and asks to see the manager.

"What is it you want?" The man-
ager's busy," replies the officious
clerk, without seeking to entertain the
man's mission, or even his name for
the manager. The stranger walks out,
goes across the hall, asks for the man-
ager there, who greets him in busi-
ness-like manner, and in half an hour
he has written a policy for him.

No manager or superintendent is too
busy to see a customer for a moment,
even if only to arrange an appoint-
ment, except those officials who are
not business men—and they are very
numerous.

A newspaper reporter calls on an of-
ficial of a large corporation, seeking
information on a subject of public in-
terest. After the official has side-stepped
for a few minutes, the reporter
comes out flat-footed and asks: "Is it
true that negotiations for the absorp-
tion by your company of the Blank
Interests have been completed, and, if
so, will it probably mean important
changes in the management of the new
interests?"

"I didn't tell you we had absorbed
any interests."

"But it is generally understood that
you have, and that certain changes
will soon be made in the list of of-
ficials, and, in fact, the story is not re-
futed from the other side."

"You assume a good deal if you print
that kind of a story," replies the of-
ficial.

"Can you not enlighten me a little
on the subject?" queries the reporter.

"No, I haven't any information for
you."

The reporter goes to his office, writes
a column story on the subject, partly
in fact, partly guessed at, and the next
day this same official calls up the edi-
tor, railing and grieving because the
report may have been more action than
fact.

"If I knew you were going to pub-
lish such a story, I would have given
you a far better one. As it is, your
report hurts our interests."

And this phase of business occurs
every week in the year. Too often men
will give a reporter just enough facts
of a subject to enable the newspaper
man to gloriously garble it. The news-
paper wants the truth of a story, and
if it can't get all the facts it is bound
to use what it has.

The higher the office a man holds,
the easier it is, generally, to get the
facts of a story from him, particularly
if he is a good business man.

The reason many people who cannot
really afford to patronize high-priced
restaurants and cafes is because their
natures rebel at the slovenly manner in
which service is conducted at the
places where prices are within their
means. It costs no more to be civil,
cleanly and respectful to each and all
than it does to be sloppy, captious, ar-
gumentative and evasive. It is a mat-
ter of business, from the barber shop
to the billion-dollar trust, and every
day is filled with illustrations of the
association that it is the easiest thing
in the world to do business with busi-
ness men, and one of the hardest things
on earth to try to do business with
men who are not business men.

Exploring Labrador.

Labrador is the last part of Canada
left unexplored, yet it is being
made known. The Herald of St.
John's, Nfld., records another of these
journeys: "On board the Virginia Lake,
due this afternoon, are Stephen Flor-
ence, of Philadelphia, and his wife, Flo-
rence, who crossed Labrador from west
to east last summer, as a honey-
moon trip, and George Elson, their
Indian guide. They left Ottawa in
June, traveled north to Hudson Bay
with the fur brigade, and from there
traversed the interior of the peninsula,
getting out about Hamilton Inlet on
Oct. 4. They endured terrible misery
in the journey through the wilds, and
had to eat their dogs, so near were
they reduced to starvation. Elson, their
guide, was the third man with Leonidas
Hubbard and Dillon Wallace when the
former starved to death near Lake Mich-
ikamau in the fall of 1903."
